FROM THE DESK OF DEAN WHITE

The students of the College of Agriculture will be presenting The Agro Show during Farm and Home Week. The Agro Show functions to acquaint the public with the most recent developments in agricultural research. It serves as a show-case of things that are on the 'drawing-board', so to speak. This year's show features the role of Agri-Business in providing and promoting the application of the tools developed by agricultural research.

The methods of, tools for, and financial basis of farming have been changing at a very rapid rate in recent decades. The magnitude and rapidity of change becomes abundantly apparent when we consider the extensive use now made of fertilizers, the control of weeds and insects by chemicals, hormones in plants and feeder cattle, farm credit, mechanized equipment, etc., etc., and realize that all of these and many more are developments that have taken place in the last 20 years. The impact of these developments on the efficiency of food production has been phenomenal. The pioneer Canadian farmer produced food for his family and four other persons; the farmer of 1950 produced food for fifteen other persons; whereas the present day farmer produces food for more than thirty other persons.

This phenomenal development has its basis in the products of agricultural research. The improved methods, equipment, chemicals and other products, the financial management techniques, are not haphazard chance developments; they are the result of ideas conceived, developed, tested, and then promoted for application. This is an ever-continuing process. The rapid progress of recent decades is but a stepping-stone to further advances yet to come.

I wholeheartedly commend this show to your attention and solicit your attendance at it. It serves as a show-case of things to come that will have great significance in the availability of high quality foods and fibres in the years ahead.

This portrait of the late Dean Rutherford now hangs in the Agricultural Hall of Fame in Toronto. The portrait was unveiled on November 13, 1966, during the Royal Winter Fair, and we are indebted to the Western Producer for the photo of this oil painting.

Dean Rutherford was Dean of Agriculture and head of the Animal Husbandry Department at the University of Saskatchewan from 1910 until his death in 1930. He was instrumental in establishing and maintaining an excellent stud of Clydesdale horses at the University and was recognized as a renowned livestock judge. (We in the motor and jet age probably don't appreciate how important draft horses were in those pioneer days). Dean Rutherford also acted as an advisor to a number of government commissions and committees and was prominent in University extension work.

Last winter, at the suggestion of Eric Beveridge, '26', the S.A.G.A. set up a committee to solicit funds to have this portrait painted, framed and suitably hung in the Agricultural Hall of Fame. The committee, consisting of Eric, Oral Young, '46, Ben Blacklock, '46, W. H. Foster, '29, and Spike Smith '15, carried out their task successfully. Oral tells me that the fund is now slightly oversubscribed. Oral acted as chairman and secretary-treasurer, but Eric and Spike were the main collectors. In all, about 75 people contributed, from as far away as Victoria, New York, California, and the Maritimes. Oral says it's quite a while since the S.A.G.A. has undertaken a project that was so popular and easy to complete, and wishes to thank all those who made the project a success. We are pleased that Dean Rutherford's contribution to Canadian agriculture could be recognized in this way and that the S.A.G.S. could assist in bringing this about.

AGROS HERE AND THERE

Bert Craig '44 reports that a Rapeseed Trade Mission from Japan visited Saskatoon July 27 - 30 , and a number of the Ag. Grads helped to show the visitors how we grow and handle rapeseed. Milt Bell of the Animal Science Department talked about research work on rapeseed meal before the cavalcade went on to the Wheat Pool Oil Mill to watch a truck trailer unload rapeseed at the elevator. This was followed by a tour of the oil plant and a visit to C.D.A. for talks and demonstrations on rapeseed varieties by Keith Downey '50 and his associates.

Next morning they visited the rapeseed growing area around Melfort. Keith Downey '50, Stan Campbell '50, Les Wetter Larry Grovum '66 and Bert Craig went along for the ride, and Harold Moss '24 gave a running commentary on the land areas on the way. The group stopped at Cam Wright's '49 feedlot operation where Cam showed his feed pens, hog feeding, grain handling and use of rapeseed meal.

The mission also visited the Prairie Regional Lab where the chemists took their turn discussing chemical and processing problems on rapeseed and rapeseed oil.

TWENTY-THIRD S.A.G.A. BONSPIEL, JANUARY 7 and 8, 1967

Eligibility - To be eligible to curl in the bonspiel a rink must consist of three Association members. The fourth curler may be a non-member and as such must curl in the lead position. Fourth year College and Second year School students are eligible to enter a rink in the bonspiel or curl in any position. Rinks entered by students must not contain a non-member.

Events - All members or rinks are eligible to enter the draw and compete in the Rutherford, Kirk, or Skelly events which are 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, respectively. The draw system will be the same as last year with two qualifying games of eight ends, and the remaining games of straight knockout of 10 ends. Every rink in the regular events is therefore guaranteed at least three games. The Hutcheon's event, open to all curlers 48 years and over, is expected to start on Saturday afternoon, January 7, and all rinks in this event will be guaranteed two games.

Entries - Team entries supplied by Skips must include all information requested on the entry form as identification discs and receipts have to be completed prior to the start of the bonspiel. Members submitting a single entry should enter their name on the entry form opposite the position which they curl so that the committee can place them with a rink. Deadline for entries is 12 noon, January 5th, 1967. Late entries will not be accepted. Entries should be forwarded to R. J.
