PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Saskatchewan Agricultural Graduates' Association was formed in 1936 with John Mitchell '24 as President. A total of twenty-five Presidents have served the Association. The strength of any Association is not dependent on any one individual; it relies on the guidance and support of many. The S.A.G.A. has been most fortunate in the wonderful help it has received from the executive members and all of those graduates who have kept up their membership.

FROM THE DEAN'S DESK

Projection of the enrollment in degree Agriculture in the next few years has been the objective of a study conducted in the past short week. The actual enrollment over the period 1950 to 1964 was correlated with a number of demographic, social, and economic factors to try and establish those which influenced the enrollment in Agriculture in each of the Colleges from Ontario to British Columbia. Then regression equations were derived which, on the basis of past relationships, provided a means of forecasting enrollment in the future.

Total University enrollment was the dominant factor and accounted for over 75% of the variability in enrollment in Agriculture in each of the provinces except B.C. Farm economic factors were shown to have a very minor influence. Number of farms and total farm population were negatively correlated with Agricultural enrollment but accounted for a relatively small proportion of the total variation. Plugging into the regression equation statistics which can be fairly reliably estimated for the year 1975 resulted in an estimate of enrollment for that year of about 340 students in Agriculture at Saskatchewan. This is almost identical with current enrollment. Since we had been hoping for and guessing that our enrollment might increase substantially, this new estimate came as a bit of a shock.

The validity of the estimate undoubtedly was and is questioned. Nevertheless, a recent bulletin from the United States Office of Education forecasts that the numbers of degrees granted in the U.S.A. in Agriculture and Forestry combined by 1975 will be about 50 per cent of those granted in recent years, so maybe we should not completely disregard the prediction made by using the regression equation.

If anywhere near correct, it probably means that greater efforts by the profession in general will have to be made if we wish to attain an increase in enrollment. If the predicted 40 per cent increase in demand for graduates in the period from between about 1964-65 and the early 1970's is realized, it seems likely that supply will fall considerably short. We likely will need to do a much better job of creating an interest in Agriculture as a career than we have been doing.

After the Sunday Tea, we had a 1948 Grad Banquet organized by Lex Rutherford. "Our Deans", Kirk and




