AGRICULTURAL GRADUATE CURLING

The 26th Annual S.A.G.A. Bonspiel will be held January 9th, 10th and 11th; if possible, a 7:00 and 9:00 p.m. draw will be scheduled Friday night at the University of Saskatchewan rink and 9:00 p.m. at the Exhibition. This Friday night draw is due to lack of ice and we need 40 rinks to curl Friday night. Please indicate on the entry form if you are available to curl Friday night at 7:00 or 9:00 p.m. This will let you out of the 8:00 a.m. game on Saturday. We would appreciate your co-operation in this regard.

As in the past, we will have the four regular events, Kirk, Rutherford, Skelly and Graham. These events will be limited to sixty-four (64) rinks with the usual guarantee of at least three games.

All rinks in the regular events will be curling in the first two qualifying games of 8 end duration which will be scored on the following point basis, one point per end scored, one-half point for each team per blank end, five points for a win and two and one-half points for a tie. On the basis of total points received in the first two games the rinks will then be placed in the event for which they have qualified. The remaining games will be of ten end duration.

The senior event or Hutcheon Event is open to all grads 48 years and over who desire a less rigorous schedule. Curling in this event will start at 12 noon Saturday, January 10th at the Exhibition curling rink.

Note: Bonspiel Headquarters and Bar are at the Exhibition Curling Rink.

Please stay at the rink where you curl your second qualifying game to receive information on your third game. All rinks except University have meal and bar facilities.

We hope to call on the old faithfuls to act as rink marshals and callers.

Eligibility

To be eligible to curl in the S.A.G.A. bonspiel, a rink must consist of at least three association members. The fourth curler may be a non-member and as such must curl in the lead position. Fourth year college and second year school students are eligible to enter a rink in the bonspiel or curl in any position. Rinks entered by students must not contain a non-member.

The fees for curling remain the same as last year (\$5.00) plus (\$2.00) for membership, per person.

In previous years many members did not curl because they had not been asked to join a rink. Don't let this hold you back. Just mail your entry form to the address below or phone 343-3527 or 343-3531. State your graduating year, address and phone number and preference of position on the entry form and we'll try to place you. We will contact you in advance of when you curl.

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
