s may be a little early to be thinking about next year's Ag. Grad. Bonspiel but we are considering changing the format of it and would like comments about it. Instead of having 2-8 end qualifying games, it is suggested that we have 6-4 end qualifying games on a point basis. This would allow teams the same number of ends as in other years — the 32 rinks that had the most points after these 6 games would go into events according to the points made. There are a couple of advantages to this system:

1) each team meets twice as many teams as before,

2) makes each end and each game more meaningful—in the other draw, the first two games are to many teams "we are better off to lose them".

We would appreciate curlers thinking about this and letting us know their thoughts — ice rentals have to be made early and this format might take some different ice times than in other years.

# HONORARY LIFE MEMBERSHIPS

Two Honorary Life Membership are awarded each year to individuals who are graduates of either the College or School and who have made outstanding contributions by personal efforts to agriculture. The 1972 recipients were Hugh J. Kidd '36 of Vandura and Ernest G. Booth '21 of St. Paul, Minnesota.

Hugh Kidd was born and still resides at Vandura. He entered and completed the Certificate course in his early

thirties and has actively farmed all his life. His activities have included school, church and livestock associations and he is noted as a breeder of Clydesdale horses and Shorthorn cattle.

Ernie Booth's home was originally Semans and he obtained his B.S.A. and M.Sc. from the U. of S. He was the first president of the Sask. Crop Improvement Association and was active in registered seed and seed cleaning circles, lectured and judged at summer fair activities. He also was a registered provincial naturalist. He joined the U.S. Federal service in 1927 and served 42 years there. Since retirement, he has taken on work connected with Indian Treaty Settlement.
