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GRADUATION NEWS

The School of Agriculture graduation exercises were held on Thursday, March 30. Main speaker for the occasion was **Doug Grant** '49, of Regina. Eighty-three diplomas were grated this year. **Steve Pavlik** of Eatonia won the University of Saskatchewan silver medal and the Scott prize, and shared the Smith-Roles prize for Rural Electrification with **Florian Bendig** of Bruno.

The College of Agriculture had 84 graduates receiving "sheepskins" at May 29th Convocation, the largest class in over 20 years. The number of graduates exceeded that of the May 1970 and May 1971 Convocations by 16% and was from 50 to 100 percent larger than in any year in the 1960's. The number of prospective graduates for May 1973 is about 15 to 20 below that of May 1972.

Employment Situation for New Graduates

The large size of the 1972 graduating class created problems in placing graduates in desired employment. Information with respect to employment was obtained from 77 of the 84 graduates at the time of Convocation. Those who had secured off-farm agrological employment, were farming by desire, or proceeding on assistantships to postgraduate work constituted 68% of the 77 graduates on whom we secured information. Nineteen graduates had temporary summer work, mainly of an agrological nature, two graduates were farming but seeking other employment. Only three recorded that they were unemployed, one of whom was the wife of a graduate who had employment. The seventy-seventh person plans to proceed to another College.

While the above record of employment is far from ideal, it is not really as dismal as appeared to be the case in late March. There is the occasional enquiry still being received from employers and new programs such as the Land Bank may open up opportunities. Hopefully in the next few months permanent full time employment may be secured by a number of those currently employed on seasonal work or unemployed.
