

Agro Inductees into the Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame



Bryan Harvey 60C

Bryan was born in Wales and came to Canada with his parents in 1948. He graduated from Bedford Road Collegiate in Saskatoon and then went on to BSA and MSc degrees at the U of S and a PhD at the University of California, Davis. Bryan began his career at the University of Guelph, but returned to the U of S in 1966.

Bryan had an outstanding research career, but is likely best known for Harrington two-row malting barley. Harrington became the new standard for malting and brewing quality and became the dominant variety in Canada and held this place for 20 years. Harrington is now being replaced by its descendants.

Bryan held numerous important positions during his distinguished career including Head of the Horticulture Department, President of the Agricultural Institute of Canada, Coordinator for Agricultural Research at the U of S and President of the Nutana Rotary Club. He is a Fellow of the Agricultural Insti-

tute of Canada and an honorary life member of both the Saskatchewan and Canadian Seed Growers Associations. In 2005 he received the Saskatchewan Order of Merit. He has also been recognized by his Saskatchewan Institute of Agrologist peers as a Distinguished Agrologist.

Robert (Bob) Knowles 41C


Bob was born at Unity and raised on the family farm. He received his BSA and MSc degrees from the U of S. He served as a Lieutenant in the Canadian army in 1943 and 1944. He earned his PhD at the University of Wisconsin in 1950.

Bob established a world-wide reputation as a grass breeder during his long career in Saskatoon with the Research Branch of Agriculture Canada. He was a pioneer in the development of grass breeding techniques and the breeding of superior grass cultivars.

He developed new varieties of several grass species that still account for a large portion of grass seed produced in Canada today. He achieved the level of principal research scientist in recognition of his achievements. He also served as an adjunct professor at the U of S.

Bob was awarded the Canadian Seed Trade Association achievement award in recognition of his outstanding work. He was awarded an hon-

orary doctorate from the U of S. He was made a Fellow of the Agricultural Institute of Canada. Internationally, he received the Distinguished Grasslander Award. In his will be bequeathed a substantial contribution to the U of S to establish the Robert P. Knowles Scholarship to support graduate students in plant breeding.



1961 Agro Reunion

Members of the University of Saskatchewan College of Agriculture class of 1961 met at Bob and Pat Bullock's just north of Maidstone for their forty-five year reunion this summer. The graduating class included thirty-eight students, all men. Seventeen of the graduates attended the event. Spouses have also become good friends and even one of the widows still attends the reunions that are held every five years. Friendships are strong and they haven't lost track of any of their former classmates. Some have passed away and a few were too sick or busy to attend the reunion but those who attended enjoyed each other's company and catching up. The group has met every five years right from the beginning and are planning their biggest gathering yet in five years when they celebrate fifty years. Gatherings have been held throughout the province and the group was pleased to enjoy the hospitality and historical tours provided by the Bullocks. To further their education they visited Dennis Wobeser's holistic cattle operation and the construction site for the Husky Oil ethanol plant. Former classmates from as far away as Nepean, Ontario, and Salt Spring Island, British Columbia joined with those as close as Lloydminster and North Battleford for the event.

The graduating class has produced farmers, an artist, two deputy agriculture ministers (one in Saskatchewan and one in Manitoba), university professors, a teacher, and those who worked for farm organizations, farm equipment companies, and fertilizer companies. Many of those who worked in the private sector are retired while those who became farmers still farm. The group has done well, living good lives, and enjoying family and travel as they have gotten a little older. Agriculture has changed a lot in the past forty-five years. Memories of the classes flooded back as the former students talked about the times when they were told never to put a tractor with more than 100 horsepower on rubber. They also reminisced about the end of an era where professors and students lamented the demise of the 2-cylinder John Deere tractor. The tractors were very reliable and repairable but they saw that there might have been a benefit to the new 6-cylinder models. Times have changed - one of their professors, who is still

lecturing to this day described the perfect beef animal as being chunky, short, square, and stocky. Technology has changed in many ways and the students have forgotten a lot of what they learned in school but they value a university education that taught them to think with broader perspective.

Seizing opportunities to learn brought the Agros Class of 1961 together in the first place but sharing the life changing experience made them dedicated friends that continue to gather and enjoy each other's company. Reprinted, with permission, from the Maidstone Mirror.



News from the College

Feeds Innovation Institute

An expanded vision and mandate for development of the feeds based industries for Saskatchewan is being initiated at the University of Saskatchewan. The Feeds Innovation Institute concept is being developed to build on the existing Prairie Feed Resource Centre (PFRC). The key strategy is to connect the current and emerging research and development centres in animal nutrition and feeds at the University of Saskatchewan with the provincial and federal governments' capacity to support development in the feed industry.

Lead of the work to develop the Institute concept will be Dr. Scott Wright, Executive Director, on secondment from Saskatchewan Agriculture and Food (SAF). "We recognize that we currently export 90 percent of the feeds produced in Saskatchewan, and there are huge opportunities to create more value adding around that," says Wright. "The Institute concept is to continue to support and build the local feed industry development initiatives, and at the same time position Saskatchewan for linking into the multi-national feed development initiatives."

Another priority being explored will be a focus on bioproducts and bio-refineries. "Feed is one of the cornerstones with biomaterials and renewable fuels" explains Wright. "No matter what area of bio-products the focus is on, everything comes back to what can be done with the coproducts streams, and therefore how to create profit from the feed corner." The University of Saskatchewan's Feed Innovation Institute concept would form part of the bio-products innovation cluster in Saskatoon. Similar to other institutes, the Feed Innovation Institute will bring cohesion and functionality to University research capacity in biofuels and biomaterials.

By building on the foundation created by PFRC of linking industry to domestic and export feed opportunities, the enhanced Feeds Innovation Institute (FII) would be well positioned to expand its mandate, and focus on drawing in more resources, both provincial and federal, to support it more aggressively.
