AG GRAD FORGES AHEAD

Iranian immigrant **Majid Damircheli 01C** has faced many obstacles in his life, but still wants to do right in his adopted country. He and his wife Nasrin had to flee Iran because of a story he had written about horses seeking freedom. They escaped to Italy, where Nasrin learned he had a bounty on his head. They approached the Canadian Embassy, and were eventually granted political asylum in Canada.

They lived first in Toronto, where they discovered his veterinarian technician and Nasrin's nursing degrees were not recognized in Canada. They opted to move to Saskatoon, where Majid graduated from the College of Agriculture with a BSA in 2001. He worked a variety of jobs around Saskatoon, including a bee farm and a swine operation, all while he and his wife were raising two children as he attended classes.

Majid and Nasrin opted to follow her dream, and open an assisted care home for the elderly. With much hard work they had formed their own company, Northern Lights Care Homes in 2006, operating 3 facilities in the city. And Nasrin was accepted into the licensed practical degree program at SIAST (Saskatoon).

But, adversity visited once more, when Nasrin died in a car accident in June 2007. For a long period of time Majid was lost without his best friend, but his children, Siavash, 17 and Sara, 12, helped him overcome the pain and slowly refocus on the plans he and Nasrin had made.

Majid is now in the process of opening a fourth assisted living home, in Winnipeg.



Books titles include *Creating the Prairie Xeriscape*, *Best Trees and Shrubs for the Prairies* (co-authored with Hugh Skinner), *Best Groundcovers & Vines for the Prairies* (with Hugh Skinner), *Perennials for the Plains and Prairies* (co-authored with Edgar W. Toop), and *In a Cold Land: Saskatchewan's Horticultural Pioneers*.

In addition Sara has written many newspaper and magazine articles and established herself as a well-known radio and television presence. What's Ernie Barber Doing Now?

Having spent a year as acting provost shepherding the university's second integrated plan to completion, Ernie Barber will now take on a leadership role for one of the key components of that plan - enhancing teaching, learning, and the student experience.

While the plan did not specifically call for the creation of a vice-provost of teaching and learning position, "we know there is a need to provide an even better academic experience for students and for all those engaged in that experience with students," said Barber whose two-year term in the post began July 1.

According to Brett Fairbairn, provost and vice-president academic, the new vice-provost will lead the university's academic innovation agenda.

In addition, Barber will be asked to oversee the development and implementation of the Foundational Document on Teaching and Learning, direct the work of academic and instructional support units like the University Learning Centre and the Centre for Continuing and Distance Education. He will also be the primary contact for associate and assistant deans, promote the use of teaching evaluation tools and work with the provincial government on new programs and program changes.
