

Copeland named to Sask Ag Hall of Fame

Bill Copeland 60C was a pioneer in the production of pulse crops, particularly lentils, and he has been a leader in adopting new farming practices. Born in 1937 in Rosetown, Bill attended Rosetown Composite High School and went on to earn his BSA degree at the U of S in 1960.

After graduation, Bill and his new bride, Alma Kingwell, took up farming near Hughton. In order to make a go of it in the early years Bill and Alma worked in Saskatoon during the winter months.

Early in his farming career, he eliminated the practice of summerfallow and adopted minimum tillage and direct seeding. His leadership was noted by friends and neighbors and Bill provided advice and support to others to make the transition.

Bill worked closely with Dr. Al Slinkard of the university Crop Development Centre and John Buchan of Saskatchewan Agriculture in helping to commercialize lentil production in Saskatchewan. West central Saskatchewan ultimately became a major producing region for lentils.

Bill began seed production at the outset of his farming career and quickly added a seed cleaning plant in 1969. All-State Grain approached Bill to process len-

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tils in preparation for export and a partnership was struck. Copeland Seeds has been a major player in the processing of pulse crops and other specialty crops for many years. Over his farming career, Bill has been an enthusiastic supporter of research.

From the mid-1960s until the 90s, he provided land free of charge to the university for testing new crops. When the university insisted that he accept payment, he reluctantly agreed and then established the Copeland Prize in Crop Science to encourage students to adopt this area of study. The malting barley CDC Copeland was named after him in recognition of his many contributions to research.

Bill served as councillor in the RM of Monet for a number of years. He was a member of the local hospital board when a new hospital was built in Elrose. He was a member of the recreation board when the town was rebuilding their rink. He was a farmer representative on the Senior Grain Transportation Committee for many years, in addition to being a member of many farm associations.



I have been working with him for several years; I know from my own experience that he earn this award by his day-to-day hard work. He always encourage people by saying "No man will work for your interests, unless they are his" , but actually I saw a man working for other people's interest, that is our Batu. He works with the herders even when the temperature is minus 38 outside on the grassland. He will stop to help the herders to build the fence and gate even it was raining. He is the person worried most about the herders when there is a big lost on the grassland area at lambing season. He tries to find out the price of all kinds of feed to provide some useful information to the herders in a dry year like this. He will talk to local processors to find out better livestock market information and try to increase the herders' income. He tries every way to increase herders' income and protect the "most beautiful" grassland in the world. Whenever he saw the sign of degradation on the grassland, I can see his concern from his eyes. I still remember he said, "protecting the beautiful grassland and assisting the poor herders is a life-long career, I wish I had started to work here earlier."

I know his heart is on the grassland and on the grassland people, but I still shocked when I heard him said like that. What a spirit he has! What a person he is! We have to say this is "the spirit of internationalism!"

Mr. Fritz deserves this award. The local herders always call him "Lao Ba" to show their respect and their love to him.

I think this award is not only for him but also for our project; this is an outcome of our project. More and more people start to recognize our effort to protecting the grassland and assisting the local people. I am more than happy to share this good news with you all - my colleagues and my friends!

Energy in Agriculture

Comment by Red Williams

With our current preoccupation with energy use and price, it is worthwhile having a look at how it impacts farming. This came up in a discussion with a friend of mine from Lafleche, SK. He had an interesting cut on the very effective manner in which farmers have used energy over the ages for the benefit of first, themselves, and then overall society.

In the beginning, our fore bearers supplemented their meat diet with wild grains and fruits and one family could only feed itself: not very energy efficient even when they learned to sow as well as reap. But then, about 11,000 years ago the wild ox was domesticated and trained to assist to till a plot of land (the horse didn't come along for another 6,000 years). It was a big step ahead except that the work animals had to be fed as well as the family, leaving only a

little for barter for other benefits. Not much changed in this basic pattern of exchanging energy for food, even when the homesteaders arrived on the prairies. Out of every quarter section the production from 120 acres was for the farmer to eat and sell, while 40 was needed to feed the energy source: the horse.

Then came the technical leap-ahead with steam, gasoline and diesel power so one farm family could feed 20 or 30 in the cities. Next came large machinery, new seeds and equipment and large acreages. A farmer could feed 80 people locally with lots left over to export. It was a long process in shifting from sweat labour to fossil fuel power.

In the present, when efforts to reduce fossil fuel use as well as green house gases have become part of political platforms everywhere, we must be very careful how we approach food production. I for one don't want to go back to hunting and gathering.

Emails since the reunion confirm that it was a great success with references to the beautiful site and most of all the continued camaraderie of the class of '61 and their spouses.



News from the College

On May 30th, President Peter Mackinnon announced that the new Dean of the college would be Dr. Mary Buhr. Until recently, Mary was serving as Interim Dean of OAC, University of Guelph, while OAC conducted its own search for a Dean. Prior to that Mary had been serving as Associate Dean (Academic) at OAC.

Mary earned a B.Sc., M.Sc. and PhD in Biology from the University of Waterloo in 1976, 1978 and 1982 respectively.

She then worked as a visiting scientist with Agriculture Canada in Brandon, Manitoba before taking a position in 1983 in the Dept. of Animal Science at the University of Manitoba.

In 1988, she moved to the Dept. of Animal and Poultry Science at the Ontario Agricultural College of the University of Guelph as an assistant professor, reaching full professor status in 2000. Mary's research interests centre on all aspects of sperm physiology and its relationship to fertility and artificial insemination.

Mary will not begin in her new role until July 1st, 2009 and hence I write this column having the pleasure of serving as Acting Dean for another year.

Dr. Andrew Van Kessel (Animal and Poultry Science) has agreed to serve as Associate Dean (Research) during that period.

Also on the personnel front, one new faculty member joined us on July 1st. Dr. Mike Rogers is now a member of Food and Bioproduct Sciences. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Guelph.

Two other faculty members will join us shortly. Dr. Tom Yates will be a lecturer in the Department of Soil Science and his duties will be closely associated with the Renewable Resource Program.

Dr. Eric Lamb will join the Department of Plant Sciences as a biometrician/statistician. Eric obtained his Ph.D. from the University of Alberta in 2007.

In other news, increased undergraduate enrolment continues to be THE College priority.

Based on the number of students admitted it appears that first-year enrolment will be similar to last year with enrolment in the Agribusiness and Renewable Resource Management programs meeting our targets. The BSA program continues to be the biggest program in the College with 136 first year students admitted at this date.

This year will see the first students enter the two new two-year diploma programs in Agribusiness and Agronomy. So far the number of students admitted to these programs is similar to last year. Final enrolment figures will not be known until

October.

Based on an agreement with Inner Mongolia Agricultural University, we do expect to enrol six students from that institution for the final two years of their program.

We will soon be breaking ground on another expansion at the Crop Science Field Laboratory. This addition will house the Grain Innovation Laboratory and new workshop space for the Soil Science Department. The Grain Innovation Laboratory will provide new and expanded laboratory facilities for the quality screening programs of the Crop Development Centre. Planning is still proceeding on the Feed Technology Research Facility.

I look forward to another year as Acting Dean and the many challenges and opportunities that I know it will bring.

In September I will be travelling to Mongolia (not to be confused with Inner Mongolia!!) to help celebrate Mongolia State University of Agriculture's 50th Anniversary. This is the University with which we are collaborating on a seven-year CIDA-funded project (Training for Rural Development).
