

He provided leadership in developing the Saskatchewan Indian Agricultural Program. He also worked extensively in development of many 4-H clubs and provided extension support for many agricultural organizations. As a sideline he operated a grain, oilseeds

and forage farm in his home area. He will be remembered by his family and friends for his quiet dedication and personality. His funeral service was held December 19, 2009 at St. David's Anglican Church, Prince Albert. Memorial donations can be made to St. David's Church and the Herb Bassett Home. We can't stress enough how important it is for teams to contact the organizers at the earliest possible time. Please get your teams together before Christmas this year and then, let us know. Thanks.


