• In 1936, 4 newsletters /year were printed & distributed for a total reported cost of \$130.

• In 2010, production and distribution of two newsletters/year cost approximately \$4000.

SAGA is a non-profit organization and regrettably the monies collected and invested by the organization will not generate sufficient capital to fund production and mailing of the newsletter into the future.

Clearly, we need to find a more cost-efficient method of reaching the membership. The answer appears to be use of the internet. If the membership would abandon the newsletter delivered via Canada Post and instead view & download the newsletter from the internet, it would cut the organizations communications costs dramatically.

Each *SAGA* member has received this newsletter via Canada Post, and the *SAGA* executive urges you to make the switch to receiving the newsletter via the internet. We want to thank the members who have already made that switch. However, we want to make it clear that for those members without internet access or those who truly wish to receive a printed copy, we will continue to honor that wish.

Bruce McLean Smith

Bruce McLean Smith 36S was recognized at the 2010 *SAGA* reunion banquet for his lifelong contributions to agriculture and on the occasion of his 75th anniversary of graduation from the College. Bruce grew up on the family homestead south of Allan, SK. Bruce entered university at the tender age of 16 and graduated from the School of Agriculture in 1936.

During WWII he was stationed in England and worked as an electrician on Halifax and Lancaster bombers. After the war Bruce returned to the Allan district, married Wilma Plyley, and together they commenced their farming careers. Bruce was a great business person. In addition to farming he sold and delivered propane, small and large electrical appliances and later owned multiple backhoes which were active installing water and sewer in many farm homes. Bruce is probably best known for establishing Smith's Tractor Wrecking.

During the 1960's it was one of the first businesses of its kind in North America and served customers from England to Australia. Bruce retired in 1985. The business he started is now operated by two of his sons. Regrettably Bruce was not well enough to attend the banquet and receive his recognition in person. His son Charlie accepted the award on his father's behalf.

Irene (Keay) Ahner 65C

Irene was born to a farm family in Unity. She completed high school in Unity and then enrolled in Arts and Science at the U of S, but switched to College of Agriculture in second year to pursue her interest in animal science. She participated in a variety of extramural activities.

Irene completed her BSA in 1965 and married **Derald Ahner 65C** and **MSc 67**. She worked for Milt Bell as a research technician until they moved to Brandon in 1967 where Derald took up a position as a Livestock Specialist. Their two daughters arrived in 1969 and 1972. In 1974 the family moved to Maple Creek to take over the Ahner family cattle farm.

Over the years Irene served on the local Wheat Pool committee, the band parents association and on the District 10 Agricultural Board in various executive roles. She is an active member of the United Church (trustee and choir member), Hospital Auxiliary, the NDP and the Music Festival Committee.

She has helped nearby 4-H clubs in their competitions, worked as a relief librarian for the Chinook Regional Library and contributed to the Golden Prairie history book

and served on committees for Piapot and Maple Creek history books. And she has been a faithful contributor to the SAGA newsletter as the "Prairie Chicken".

Further from home, Irene served as the SAGA rep to the Advisory Council to the Faculty of Agriculture (76-81) and as a member of a national CBC Advisory Committee on Agriculture and Food (87-90). She served two terms on the University Senate. And she is an avid Roughriders fan.

Agro Families I Have Known

1. The Flatens of Weyburn

By my count, 11 Flatens have passed through the hallowed walls at U of S to study agriculture - a record number from one family group. The Flatens had Scandinavian heritage. Nels came to the Weyburn area directly from Norway and Svea's family came from Sweden, after a short stay in South Dakota. They married in 1925 and established the original Flaten farm in the Rockfield community, west of Weyburn in 1930. The Flaten clan of Ag Grads come from three offspring of Nels & Svea and they went in three directions – (i) Soils (ii) Economics and last and most important iii) Practical – i.e real farmers.

Norm Flaten must be considered a bit of an interloper as he graduated from Agricultural Engineering in 1950 but he begat 3 legitimate Agros so he has always been one of ours. Norm's gang were the Soils group - maybe it had something to do with the challenging Solonetzic soils that made up a significant part of his Trossachs area farm.

In addition to the farm, Norm spent 17 winters instructing in Ag Eng at U of S, was Reeve of RM of Brokenshell for many years, and had significant involvement with Weyburn Inland Terminal and Ag Societies. Norm and Vie's Soils gang were: **Don 78C**, who went on to a PhD in Manitoba and is now Prof of Soil Science at U of M.

Brent 80C, who has been in the crop inputs industry, Alberta Ag as a Regional Soil Specialist and is now at the Sask Ag Knowledge Centre as Integrated Pest Management specialist in Moose Jaw.

Patricia 82S, 86C, MSc'02 has served in several posts including SSCA, the Conservation Learning Centre, SIAST ag programs and is now Research Manager at SaskCanola.

Glenn 50S, 56C led the charge in the Economics area. In addition to the pig and poultry farm near Regina he served as leader for a variety of agricultural organizations, including the President of the Agriculture Institute of Canada, Canadian Federation of Agriculture and the International Federation of Agricultural Producers.

Glenn and Shirley's gang of money men included: **Wayne 84S**, who carried on the family farm at Regina, **Murray 83C** Ag banking in SK and BC, then ag policy in MB and **Gord 89C** went on to an MSc – Ag Econ in Manitoba and is VP (Marketing and Sales) at the Canadian Wheat Board

Delbert 57S – last and most important- the practical gang who produce the goods so the rest of us can survive.

Delbert and Doris' group were **Gary 80S**, who went on to a Commerce degree and served at Westco Fertilizers and is now with BC AG in the Okanagan. **Raymond 81S** is on the original Weyburn home farm and is on the Board of Weyburn Inland Terminal.

So, there you have it – the Flaten name rings strong and true through the Ag industry in Canada and we thank them for choosing the U of S and for their contribution to the Ag industry.

Shebeski Dr. Leonard Hylary O.C., Dr.Sc., F.R.S.C., F.A.I.C. August 5th, 1914, to August 3rd, 2010 Dr. Len Shebeski passed away at Broadmead Lodge in Victoria, BC on August 3rd, 2010. He was born in Aubigny, MB. At the age of three his family moved to a farm just outside of Arborg MB, where he grew up.

Len received an undergraduate degree in Agriculture from the University of Manitoba in 1941, and then served in the R.C.A.F. ~ first as an Observer ~ and then as a Pilot-Instructor. After the war, he completed a Masters degree in Plant Science at the University of Manitoba. He taught at the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon until 1953, when he became Department Head of Plant Science at the University of Manitoba. In 1965, he was appointed Dean of Agriculture at the University of Manitoba, where he continued as Dean until his retirement in 1979.

After retirement he continued to enjoy working on projects for CIDA and the World Bank, including a one-year stay in Ibadan, Nigeria as Director of Research at the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture. Leonard held honorary degrees from the University of Saskatchewan, the University of Manitoba, Queen's University, and the Warsaw Agricultural University of Poland.

He was a Fellow of the Agricultural Institute of Canada, the Royal Society of Canada and a foreign member of the Lenin All-Union Academy of Agricultural Sciences in Moscow. In 2004, Len was inducted into The Manitoba Agriculture Hall of Fame. In 1977, he became an Officer of the Order of Canada.

Bill Small 48S - Born November 18 1927 died November 18 2010. Bill was born and raised in the Craven District where after graduating from the UofS in 1948 he farmed and ranched. Bill kept in touch with many of his classmates until the time of his death. Bill had an outstanding herd of Shorthorn cattle until 1972 when he switched to Simmental and developed an equally impressive herd.

Bill grew up as a 4Her and later was a leader. He was a sought after cattle judge at shows in Canada and also judged in Argentine and in Ireland. Bill was one of the founding Directors of Canadian Western Agribition and also served as its President and was a strong advocate of making Agribition truly international. As well he was a perennial director of the Regina ExhibitionAssociation and served as President there as well. Bill was quite possibly the most respected livestock man in Saskatchewan.

Bill had a keen sense of humor and was a conciliatory person; he got along with everyone and inspired many to be better farmers and stockmen. Bill received Saskatchewan's highest award, the Saskatchewan Order of Merit in 2002

He received many livestock awards and also was given the highest award granted by the International Simmental Association. Bill was always proud of being an Ag Grad from the University of Saskatchewan. Saskatchewan has lost an outstanding citizen and agriculture a truly dedicated farmer/rancher

Dale Norheim 72C, a longtime Charolais breeder and purebred sales manager, was killed in a farm accident Oct. 16/10. Born and raised in the White Bear area of Saskatchewan, he and his wife, Lesley, started a farm near Saskatoon in 1976 and raised purebred and commercial Charolais cattle. The operation became D Bar L Livestock, a sales management business. Norheim became involved in the breed in 1960 and struck up a long relationship with Calgary breeder John Rudiger, who hired him to show Charolais at fairs and exhibitions.

After earning an agriculture degree, he worked as a record of performance technician and later ran the daily operations of the ROP bull test station at the university. He had an interest in breeding records and pedigrees and was hired as fieldman and sales representative for the *Canadian Charolais Banner* in 1973.

After leaving the magazine in 1981, he started his own sales management business and also ran the annual Norheim and

Guests female sale with the Sterling Collection, which becamethe longest-running annual Charolais female sale in Canada.

Norheim was a board member of the Canadian Charolais Association and chaired the breed improvement committee. The Saskatchewan Charolais Association recognized the Norheims for their dedication and service to the industry in 2004.

Harapiak, John Theodore 63C February 20, 1937 - January 14, 2011 John Harapiak, beloved husband of Deanna, passed away peacefully on January 14, 2011 at the age of 73 years. John will be lovingly remembered by his family and many friends. A Celebration of John's Life was held at Southview Alliance Church (1436 James McKevitt Road S.W.) on Friday, January 21, 2011.

John helped bring about extensive change in how Canadian farmers work the land. He was key in the development of nutrient and soil management strategies prairie farmers have come to depend on. As the chief agronomist for Western Co-operative Fertilizer, Westco, John has been described by his agronomy colleagues as visionary when it came to leading the way in the evolution of crop production in Western Canada. John is credited with researching areas that directly benefit producers and also ensuring that those messages reached into the countryside. He conducted extension work with producers and encouraged graduate students to pursue research that would benefit agriculture as a whole. John's research led farmers to move away from broadcast fertilizing methods to banding, which improved yields and efficiency. He also helped set up guidelines for rates of application, showed the effects of tillage and fertilizer in western Canadian soils and crops, developed top dressing rates for prairie crops, created a fertilizer research checkoff and championed the creation of the regional Certified Crop Advisor program.

Jock John Robert Blacklock 43C Jock (John Robert) Blacklock was born October 13, 1921 in Maymont, Saskatchewan and passed away peacefully on January 23rd, 2011 in Prince Albert Saskatchewan. After growing up in Maymont during the Thirties, Jock attended the University of Saskatchewan and graduated from the College of Agriculture in 1943. During a short illness at Saskatoon City Hospital, Jock met Mabel Barry, a nurse, and they married in June, 1946. After a brief time with the federal government's Agriculture Department, Mabel and Jock decided to pursue an opportunity they saw for a new, young livestock auctioneer based in Western Canada.

Following a ten-day auctioneering course in Iowa, Jock returned home and Blacklock Auction Service was established, followed by Saskatoon Auction Mart in 1961 and the development of a significant Purebred Hereford herd on their farm east of Saskatoon. Even with their demanding business concerns, Mabel and Jock were dedicated parents to their large family, active in the community and their church, and frequent hosts of large gatherings of friends and family on the farm. Jock retired in 1986 after selling the 35th Calgary Bull Sale of his career, and from there Mabel and Jock threw themselves into additional volunteer activities, a great interest in birdwatching, and time with their children and grandchildren. Jock was inducted into the Saskatchewan Agriculture Hall of Fame in 1995. Mabel and Jock moved to Prince Albert in October 2007 to Good Shepherd Villas so that they could remain together.

Harold Reid Baker June 29,1927 March 18, 2011 Harold was born in Merrickville, Ontario, to Milburn and Evelyn Baker (nee Baldwin). The youngest of six children, he was favoured, loved and admired by all his siblings. He was predeceased by his parents, granddaughter Tori Slade, brothers and spouses Mervin and Winnie, Arden and Lillian, sisters and spouses Vera and Arthur Moorhouse, Elsie and Trevor Pelton, and sister Fern Bryan. Left to remember him are his loving wife of 54 years, Phyllis; his son Brian with wife Tracy and their sons Davis, Liam and Seth; daughter Diane with husband Robert Phillips and their sons Alex, Arden, Avery and Aaron; daughter Brenda with husband Arthur Slade and their daughter Tanaya; brother-in-law Carl Bryan; fifteen nieces and nephews and their families; and many friends and colleagues.

Harold studied animal science at the Ontario Agricultural College, University of Toronto, following a two-year program at Kemptville Agricultural School. He was then employed as an Ag Rep advising farmers and promoting 4-H and Junior Farmer programs in Wentworth and Huron counties in Ontario. He soon realized it would be of benefit to better understand group dynamics and how people interact. This led him to a Master of Science degree in Extension Education at the University of Wisconsin. A serendipitous series of events resulted in his attaining a PhD in Rural Education and Sociology at Cornell University in 1958. As his studies were nearing completion, Harold was invited to join the new Centre for Community Studies at the University of Saskatchewan where he participated in groundbreaking research regarding the future of Saskatchewan's rural communities.

From 1963 to 1973 he served as Professor and Director of the university's Extension Division. He continued to work in Extension, maintaining a strong focus on community development, until his retirement in 1994. He was always proud of the university and Saskatoon and couldn't wait to show off the campus and the river view to visitors.
