William (Bill) D. Heenan 1949 School

Bill was born in 1929. His father William emigrated from Northern Ireland in 1912, married Annie White of Zehner, SK and they took up farming in the Grand Coulee SK district. After graduating, Bill returned to the family farm and began a life-long career in agriculture. He married Eleanor in '53 and they had two children, **Dale '74S** and Debra.

Early on, Bill recognized the benefits of better crop varieties and became a registered seed grower in '55. He was actively involved with the Sask Seed Growers Assoc. (SSGA) uas a member of the Board of Directors during the 70's and as President in '78-'79. Bill saw the need for improved grain handling equipment and launched Heenan Industries which manufactured hydraulic drill fills and grain augers. In 1976, Bill was presented with the SSGA award for outstanding service, an honour given to a Saskatchewan seed grower who has made a significant contribution to

Cecilia was the youngest of 15 children in a family that farmed in the Cactus Lake - Macklin area. Education was a high priority for her immigrant parents and many of her siblings are U of S grads. Cecilia's husband Al Mulhern is a '70°C Ag grad, as is daughter Tara '05°C. Three nephews passed through the halls of AgBio: Allan '78°C, Warren '88°S, and Brian '96°C Kohlman, plus Brian's wife Leanne '00°C.

Cecilia was active in student council, sports and as a lab tech in Soils. Upon graduation she began her professional career by becoming the first female Ag Rep in the province. Then time as a Rural Municipal Asses. Officer and an Irrigation Agrologist. Cecilia and Al began farming full time near Meyronne in 1982, but she continued working part-time instructing Extension courses and as a field per-

son with the Sask Ag Livestock Loan Guarantee Program. Cecilia has been a Returning Officer for the Constituency and Health Board, a Census Commissioner for Stats Can, board member of the Mankota Credit Union, a member for both the Ag Ext. Review Committee and the Southwest Watershed Advisory Authority, and a director of the Sask Water Corp.

Volunteerism is a strong focus for Cecilia, and she has always been active in community organizations such as the Music Festival, Housing Authority, Arts Council Dinner Theatre, the Kincaid School and the School Board. She is an advocate and fundraiser for the Canadian Cancer Society. As an avid quilter she has created and donated numerous quilts for many fund-raising charities.

At present, Cecilia continues as a Peer Review member of Environmental Farm Plans for the Provincial Council of A.D.D. and represents the R.M. of Pinto Creek #75 on the Notekeu Asses. Appeal Board. She is serving a second term as a director on the Five Hills Health Authority Board of Moose Jaw. She recently achieved her Professional Director Certification from the Johnson Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy, U of R.

Cecilia and Al continue to farm and enjoy spending time with Tara, her husband Ross and three grandchildren.

the pedigreed seed industry and shown leadership in their community.

Bill is a tireless promoter of pedigreed seed, and was one of the original founders of the show at the Canadian Western Agribition and served as the show's first Chairman in '80-'81. In 1982, Bill was recognized nationally by the Canadian Seed Growers Association (CSGA) by being named a Robertson Associate. This award is named after the original founder of the CSGA and is its highest honour. It recognizes seed growers who have emulated the original goals of the CSGA. The award is presented to members who have fulfilled, with commitment and success, their obligations to the association.

The Heenan farm has acted as host to many foreign visitors to the province, including delegations from China, NATO, the Warsaw Pact and the British Commonwealth Agricultural Society. Bill also found time to belong to other ag related organizations. He was on the local Wheat Pool committee, a director of Co-op Hail from '56 to the '90's, and the chaiman of Sask Crop Insurance from '83 to '86. He was appointed to the Prairie Implement Manufacturers Assoc. in 1986, and was the PIMA rep for the Prairie Ag Machinery Institute. He was also a member of both the Palliser Wheat Growers and Flax Growers Associations

Dean Speak

Dear Friends.

The long-awaited warm weather is here, and as I type, much seeding in the country and work in the city is going on. I wish everyone health and happiness as we jump into this busy time.

There have been some noticeable changes recently. You will be aware that the University is facing a large potential budget deficit. Regardless of whose interpretations or figures that you use, Saskatchewan's support for higher education is among the top two nation-wide. Despite that, our costs will soon outrun income, and to prevent that deficit from happening, the U of S is undertaking a two-pronged reduction of its operating budget.

First, everywhere across campus, positions are being closed and this immediate reduction has necessitated AgBio laying off five staff, and ceasing to maintain a sheep flock. These were not easy decisions, but we believe that the College will be able to adapt and continue to meet its mandate of teaching, research and service with excellence. We are centralizing both the financial management and the graduate student services, thereby providing a smaller but focused core of experts that will continue to provide excellent support to our faculty and students. Ongoing and future sheep research and teaching will continue with just the needed animals bought and housed on campus for the time needed; no sheep courses will be eliminated.

The second reduction of the University's budget involves looking campus-wide at everything we do - all of the University's academic and administrative programs. Over the years, a university happily adds on new things that it can do, but almost never eliminates anything. A task force of people from all walks of the campus will evaluate every program and specify those that are least critical to the University's core objectives. This report, due the end of the year, will guide decisions on which programmatic reductions should be considered.

These are difficult decisions. But everyone must live within their means, and a university is no different. I am convinced that AgBio's excellence and our significant contributions to the province and world will carry on. It is an uneasy time, but our fabulous Agro camaraderie and common sense keeps our eyes focused on all our blessings and the long-term goals the province and world need us to achieve.

One of our largest blessings is our fabulous students. Applications to the College for the fall are up about 10 per cent, which is much more than the average across campus. Our new Animal Biosciences degree is particularly attracting attention. Research is strong and we are eagerly anticipating the first impacts of the Global Institute for Food Security. The College is a little leaner, but we are strong and growing and determined to serve better than ever!

The College of Agriculture and Bioresources has numerous student groups which contain an assortment of focuses ranging from dairy farming to rodeoing to business to name a few. These groups draw students from all across campus.

The Agricultural Students' Association is one of these groups, and has put on many events in the past school year. The second half of the school year was just as eventful, with numerous events and activities! In January, the annual graduation celebration was held by the ASA and also a blood donating competition against the Engineers to determine who could rally the most support for donating blood. In February, the association raised money for the annual Kinsmen Telemiracle, and also supported and participated in the AgBio challenge. This coming September the year will kick off with 'Blue Week' which consists of numerous activities to help get the first years aquainted with other students and the college. Ag Bag Drag *GOOSE* will take place in November, and there will be different activities to get everyone in the mood for Ag Bag Drag *GOOSE*. The ASA is always looking for new students to become involved in the association and activities!

The Stockman's Club is the umbrella group from which several sub-groups branch out, including Dairy Team, Range Team, Judging Team, and the University of Saskatchewan Rodeo Team.

The Dairy Team is a newly developed student group that was put together last year. The club's main interest is learning about the different aspects of the dairy industry, and includes going on farm tours and listening to industry speakers. This past year members of the dairy team attended the World Dairy Expo in Madison, WI and plan to attend October 2013 as well. At the Expo, the group watched world-class dairy shows, learned about new dairy technologies, attended seminars, and toured dairy farms in the area. In November they also partook in milking demonstrations at Agribition in Regina, and in March took a tour of the new dairy barn which is being built on campus.

Range Team has meetings to discuss range management, with topics including range ecology, grazing, and range improvement. The team partakes in an annual trip to the Society of Range Management Conference, which takes place in Oklahoma City every

February. Throughout the year, meetings and presentations help to prepare the members of the team for the Undergrad Range Management Exam at the conference, where they compete with other teams across North America.

Judging Team attended judging competitions held by Vermilion and Winnipeg. The team is also planning to host their own judging competition next fall, and potentially attending the competitions in Olds, AB and Guelph, ON.

The University of Saskatchewan Rodeo Team is planning for their second Annual U of S Rodeo this coming September, as their Rodeo last fall was a great success. The rodeo showcased many major events, bringing out a large crowd to watch the events and end off the weekend with a cabaret. Members of the team travelled and competed in other rodeos and will continue to compete in the next year.

The Agri-Marketing Association (CAMA) has many new and returning members this past year. Every year the CAMA group develops a marketing plan to present in April in Kansas City, Missouri. The group has had numerous presentations from professors and industry professionals to help support the understanding of agriculture-related businesses. A workshop on Ag Expert software with FCC and an FCC lecture dealing with financing and opportunities for young people in the agriculture industry was also put on by the club.

With these numerous events and activities taking place throughout the school year, the students within the College of Agriculture and Bioresources are kept very busy with academics and interests in student clubs.




