He taught Field Husbrandry and in addition headed that Department to advocating "black summerfallow." Mr. Bracken was a star defenseman on the 1912-13 Interfaculty Championship hockey team. He went on from Saskatchewan to become Premier of Manitoba and later to be national leader of the Progressive Conservative party in Canada.

S.A.G.A. BONSPIEL - JANUARY 9 and 10, 1965

Headquarters - The Exhibition Stadium Curling Rink (just inside the main gate).

Entry - Enter early and avoid disappointment.

Eligibility - To be eligible for play in the Bonspiel a rink must consist of three Association members. The fourth player may be a non-member and as such must play the lead position. Fourth year College students and Second year School students are eligible for this Bonspiel.

Skips - Please use the attached form to make your entry. Give complete information if possible. Enter even if your rink is not complete and committee will find curlers for you.

Team Entries are preferable, however, if you want to curl and are unable to make up a rink, send in the entry form giving name, address and the positions you curl. The committee will place you on a rink, if possible.

Veterans Event - This is a new event this year and is restricted to 12 rinks. Eligibility is the same as for the regular 'spiel except for the age requirement. All participants in this event must be 48 or more years old. The first game in this event is scheduled for 12 noon at the Exhibition Stadium Curling Rink. The event will be a straight Knockout competition with one prize to be awarded. If less than six rinks enter, a different type of draw will be played in this event.

First games in the regular 'spiel start at 8.00 o'clock Saturday Morning.

A Highlight of the 1964 Reunion was Official Re-naming of School of Agriculture Building to Kirk Hall

The School of Agriculture Building is now officially named. At an impressive ceremony at the last Farm Week Harold Moss unveiled a bronze plaque naming Kirk Hall in honor of Dr. L. Kirk. The plaque was presented by the S.A.G.A.

The ceremony was unique in a way inasmuch as Dr. Kirk was present to receive this recognition of his services. Dr. Kirk joined the Field Husbandry Department in 1917. In 1937, he became Dean of the College of Agriculture and served in this post until 1947 when he moved on to FAO in Rome, Italy. Dr. Kirk is the present chairman of the Board of Governors of the University of Saskatchewan.

CONSTITUTION AMENDMENTS - The Constitution Revision Committee consisting of Bob Brack, Chairman, Eiler Humbert and Oral Young '46, presented their report to the last Executive meeting of the S.A.G.A. The report was accepted and it was agreed that the following amendments would be placed before the annual meeting, January 12th. The amendments are as follows by Article Number and Section. Where additions have been made they are underlined. Sections changed or deleted are given in full with the proposed change.

- Article 2(a) To promote the social interests of the College and School of Agriculture, University of Saskatchewan.
- Article 2(c) Delete To assist whenever possible in securing positions for graduates of the College.

Proposed revision - To keep graduates informed of recent developments in the various fields of agriculture.

- Article 3(a) 1. Graduates of the Saskatchewan College and School of Agriculture, regular or ad eundem, Degree or Diploma, and any persons who have discontinued either the Degree or Diploma course after two years without receiving a degree or diploma, and whose class has since graduated, shall be eligible to become regular members of the Association (Amend. 1942)
- Article 3(a) 2. Graduates of Colleges and Schools of Agriculture other than the University of Saskatchewan may be admitted as Associate Members on payment of the regular membership fee per annum. Such members shall be extended the privilege of full membership in the Association, except that of being an officer of the Association.

(Amend. 1948)

- Article 3(b) Delete Regular and Associate members shall enjoy all the rights and priviliges of the Association (Amend. 1948)
- Article 4(a) It is proposed that offices of Secretary and Treasurer be combined into the single office of Secretary-Treasurer.
 - (a) The officers of the Association shall be:
 - 1. Honorary President
 - 2. Past President (Amend. 1949)
 - 3. President
 - 4. Vice-President
 - 5. Secretary-Treasurer
 - 6. Registrar
 - 7. News Editor (Amend. 1946)
- Article 4(c) 2. It is proposed in this section that the term of office for the representative to Advisory Council be changed from one to three years.
 - 2. The representative to the Advisory Council for the College of Agriculture, such representative to be elected at the annual meeting by the Association and to hold office for three years. (Amend. 1948)

- Article 4(f) delete All Officers shall be eligible for re-election (Amend. 1948)
 All officers, except the president, shall be eligible for re-election to the same office.
- Article 5(c)(d) delete These two sections outline the duties of the Secretary and Treasurer. Since it is proposed above to combine these two offices section (c) and (d) are outdated. Proposed revision.
 - (c) The secretary-treasurer shall keep a record of the business of the Association. He shall give notice of all meetings of the Association, executive, regular or special; shall present a written report to the annual meeting and conduct all correspondence authorized by the Executive. He shall receive and account for all moneys belonging to the Association.

Article 5(e)

Article 6. Care of Funds

The funds of the Association shall be deposited in a chartered bank or other accredited financial institution to the credit of the Association. All payments shall be made in a manner satisfactory to the Auditor; the President or Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer shall be authorized signing authorities. A financial statement shall be submitted by the Secretary-Treasurer to the annual meeting or to any other meeting if requested by the Executive. The Executive shall appoint an Auditor who shall audit the accounts of the Association at least once a year. The fiscal year of the Association shall be the calendar year, January 1 to December 31 inclusive.

- Article 7(b) 2. delete Members of the 1915-20 classes shall have the opportunity of becoming life members upon payment of \$5.00. (Amend. 1950)
- Article 11. Quorum Four members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Executive. Ten members of the Association exclusive of the Executive, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any annual meeting of the Association.

Proposed amendent - that the number of members necessary for a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the executive be raised from four to eight.
