SASKATCHEWAN RHODES SCHOLARS AMONG B.S.A. GRADUATES

Of all the Colleges at the University of Saskatchewan, the probability of being awarded a Rhodes Scholarship is highest for the student in the College of Agriculture. This is a fact of history of the past 35 years during which B.S.A. graduates have won this pinnacle award four times. In three of the past 11 years, the Rhodes Scholars have been B.S.A. graduates. Over this latter period there have been first eight, and latterly nine, Colleges at the University granting first degrees. The student population in the College of Agriculture has been about 1/25 of that of the total University. These facts confirm the validity of the opening statement.

The latest recipient of the Rhodes Scholarship is <u>Douglas Francis McArthur</u>, B.S.A. '65, of Watrous, Saskatchewan. He is currently studying <u>Economics</u> at the University of Chicago.

The second most recent B.S.A. recipient is <u>Terrence Stanley Veeman</u>, B.S.A. '62, of Macrorie, Saskatchewan. After utilizing the Scholarship at Oxford, Mr. Veeman is now on a Ph.D. program at the University of California.

Thomas Lawrence Powrie, B.S.A. '54, of Valor, Saskatchewan, was the Rhodes Scholar is his year of graduation. He is currently on the staff of the University of Alberta.

All of these Rhodes Scholars had strikingly similar scholastic attainments in their undergraduate years. Two of the three had been awarded the Saskatchewan Institute of Agrologists' Undergraduate Scholarship. All three received the Saskatchewan Institute of Agrologists' Graduation Prize as the College's most distinguished graduate in their year. All three won the Governor General's Gold Medal as the University's most distinguished graduate in their year. Each of these had, of course, held other Entrance and Undergraduate Scholarships. Finally, all three had specialized in Agricultural Economics.

Although not a Rhodes Scholar, <u>Arthur William Woods</u> of Minnedosa, Manitoba, won the College's and University of Saskatchewan's highest award on graduation with the B.S.A. degree in 1951. He was in the Agricultural Economics option as well. He is currently on the staff of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics at Manitoba. This makes a total of four Governor General's Gold Medalists from the College of Agriculture over the last 14 year period. This is further evidence of the exceptionally high scholastic and leadership ability among College of Agriculture students at Saskatchewan.

AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

The underlined portion of the following Article 3 (a) Section One, will be suggested as an addition to that article at the 1966 annual meeting of the Saskatchewan Agricultural Graduates Association:

Graduates of the Saskatchewan College and School of Agriculture, regular or ad eundem, Degree or Diploma, and any persons who have discontinued either the Degree or Diploma course after two years without receiving a degree or diploma, and whose class has since graduated, and graduates of the Saskatchewan College of Graduate Studies with specialization in an Agricultural Science, shall be eligible to become regular members of the Association.

(Amend. 1965)

TWENTY-SECOND S.A.G.A. BONSPIEL, JANUARY 8 and 9, 1966

Eligibility -	To be eligible to curl in the bonspiel a rink must consist of three
	Association members. The fourth curler may be a non-member and as
	such must curl in the lead position. Fourth year College and Second
	year School students are eligible to enter a rink in the bonspiel or
	curl in any position. Rinks entered by students must not contain a
	non-member.

- All members or rinks are eligible to enter the draw and compete in the Rutherford, Kirk, or Skelly events which are 1st, 2nd and 3rd, respectively, this year. Members 48 years of age and older have the opportunity, if they desire, of competing in the Hutcheon event.

- Team entries supplied by Skips must include all information requested on the entry form as identification discs and receipts have to be completed prior to the start of the bonspiel. Members submitting a single entry should enter their name on the entry form opposite the position which they curl so that the committee can place them with a rink. Deadline for entries is 12 noon, January 5th, 1966. Late entries will not be accepted. Entries should be forwarded to Grant Milne, Box 500, University of Saskatchewan, Saskatoon.
