From the Desk of Dean White

For the year 1968-69 enrolment in Degree Agriculture displayed a considerable upward surge. At the beginning of the term there were 394 students registered. This is 51 above that of a year ago and is approaching the peak of 436 students attained in 1947.

The actual number admitted into First Year has not changed appreciably over the past three years. The gain in total enrolment has been largely the result of a substantial number of students transferring into Agriculture from other Colleges. There were 32 such transfers in 1968-69, and 30 the year before. The bulk of the transfers are from Arts and Science.

It is of interest to note that in the immediate post World War II period enrolment in Degree Agriculture comprised over 10% of the total University enrolment in the province. We now have only about 2.8% of the total University enrolment in Saskatchewan. This percentage ranged around 4.5 to 5.0 in the period centering around 1960. It then took a sudden and drastic drop and, until this year, has continued to decline slowly. We have held our own this year.

Registration in the School is down slightly this year. The count in first year is 100, and 101 in second year.

A Japanese Travelogue

This summer Dr. Bell, head of the Animal Science Dept., and I visited Japan for two weeks as part of an 8-man trade mission sponsored by the Rapeseed Association of Canada. The contrasts were great in both industry and agriculture. Highly efficient industrial complexes were developing at a tremendous rate alongside an agriculture which still must rely heavily on hand labour to plant, harvest, and thresh their main field crops. Despite this problem, many of the farm homes look large and the owners prosperous. However, the trend away from the farm is obvious, and in the words of the Japanese "farming is becoming an old woman-young child-operation". As in Canada the farm operator finds it more profitable to have a part-time job in town. The young people, too, are migrating to the cities and to jobs requiring less manual labour. One of the results of the reduction in farm labour has been a 75% decline in the Japanese rapeseed acreage. It is evident that full and efficient mechanization of field crop production in southern Japan would require an almost impossible consolidation and reallocation of land holdings. Industrial development may be seen on all sides. Along the coasts and in the harbours, acre upon acre of new land is being reclaimed from the sea. Large manufacturing complexes are being constructed on this reclaimed land. With this industrialization the problem of smog is multiplying rapidly. In Tokyo on an average sunny day light levels on photographic meters are nearly half that expected in Western Canada, and the sun sets into a smog an hour early. The smog problem is aggravated daily as more cars and trucks take to the already clogged streets, and as newly constructed industrial plants spew their wastes skyward. The Japanese people are concerned but say that it has all happened so fast that there has not been time to enact the necessary regulations.

The 25th Annual S.A.G.A. Bonspiel will be held January 11th and 12th with, we hope, a 7:00 and 9:00 P.M. draw Friday night at the University of Saskatchewan rink. This Friday night draw is due to lack of ice and we need at least 20 rinks to curl Friday night. Please indicate on the entry form if you are available to curl Friday night at 7:00 or 9:00 P.M. This will let you out of one game Saturday A.M.

As in the past we will have the 4 regular events, Kirk, Rutherford, Skelly and Graham. These events will be limited to sixty-four (64) rinks with the usual guarantee of at least 3 games.
