FROM THE DESK OF THE DEAN

Of interest at this time of year is the matter of registration in the College and in the School. Very succinctly, we were discouraged by the College registration and elated by that in the School.

With only 81 first year students in the Degree program, the intake is the lowest that it has been since 1959-60. In 1967-68 and again in 1968-69 we had an intake of about 145 students. Last year it was 110, so the drastic decline is yery apparent and is of very real concern. Four years hence, under normal employment conditions, the demand will certainly exceed the supply of new graduates. To avoid a continuance of this trend, we need the help of all graduates in recruiting students into the Degree program.

On the other hand, the applications for admission to first year of the School of Agriculture are at a level higher than that for many years. At the time of writing about 150 students had applied for the 125 available seats. A year ago the registration in first year of the School was 90.

We were interpreting the decline in the registration in first year of the College to the depressed agricultural situation but the buoyancy in applicants for admission to the School leaves this explanation in doubt. An interpretation of the reasons for the prevailing situation is hard to come by.

In total, in the Degree program we have 329 students this year compared to 390 a year ago. In the fourth year of the Degree program there are 81 students so we will again have a large graduating class. We can only hope that the employment opportunities will improve so that all can be employed upon graduation.

Since the School does not begin until October 19th, the total registration is not definitely known at this stage. In all likelihood it will be around 200 which, if realized, will be an increase of about 30 over the 1969-70 year.
