# NOTICE TO MEMBERS

The executive give notice of intent to submit the following constitution changes to the annual meeting in January, 1971.

a) Article 3. Membership

Subsection 2. To be amended to read: "Graduates of Colleges and Schools of Agriculture other than the University of Saskatchewan and staff of faculties at the University of Saskatchewan which have an association with agriculture may be admitted as Associate Members on payment of the regular membership fee per annum. Such members shall be extended the privilege of full membership in the Association, except that of being an officer of the Association."

The purpose of this amendment as underscored is to legalize a practice now in use and to clear up questions concerning curling eligibility in the annual bonspiel.

b) Article 3.

Subsection 4. delete "Section (a)"

This is an error in the present constitution since there is no Section (a).

c) Article 7. Fees

Section (b). To be amended to read: "Life membership fees shall be according to fee schedule as follows:

Years Since Graduation	Life Membership
0 - 5	\$ 40.00
6 - 10	35.00
11 - 15	30.00
16 - 20	25.00
20 or more	20.00

The purpose of this amendment is a revision of the fee schedule and a new basis of assessment. The Life fees were not revised at the time the annual fees were raised from \$1.00 to \$2.00 for 1969. Furthermore the present fee assessment basis requires records of fee payment which have been impossible to maintain. Therefore the sliding scale above is suggested as both equitable and simpler to manage.

#### CURLING

The 27th Annual S.A.G.A. Bonspiel will be held January 8, 9 and 10th with a 7:00 and 9:00 P.M. draw Friday night at the University of Saskatchewan rink and a 9:00 P.M. draw at the Exhibition Curling Rink. This Friday night draw is due to lack of ice and we need 40 rinks to curl Friday night. This will let you out of the 8:00 A.M. Saturday game.

As in the past, we have the 4 regular events, Kirk, Rutherford, Skelly and Graham. These events will be limited to sixty-four (64) rinks with the usual guarantee

of at least three (3) games.

All rinks in the regular events will be curling in the first two qualifying games of 8 end duration which will be scored on the following point basis, one point per end scored, one-half point for each team per blank end and five points for a win. On the basis of total points received in the first two games the rinks will then be placed in the event for which they have qualified. The remaining games will be of 10 end duration.

The senior Hutcheon Event is open to all grads 48 years and over who desire a less rigorous schedule. Curling in this event will start at 12:00 noon Saturday at

the Exhibition Curling Rink.

Curling will be done at the following Saskatoon rinks: Exhibition Curling Club — Bonspiel Headquarters and Bar; University Rink; Nutana Curling Club; Granite Curling Club.

Please stay at the rink where you curl your second qualifying game to receive information on your third game.

#### Eligibility

To be eligible to curl in the S.A.G.A., bonspiel, a rink must consist of at least three Association members. The fourth curler may be a non-member and as such must curl in the lead position. Fourth year College and second year School students are eligible to enter a rink in the bonspiel or curl in any position. Rinks entered by students must not contain a non-member.

The fees for curling for this year will be six (6) dollars plus two (2) dollars for membership per person.
