# 6. Reports

# a) ASA – Carson Jorgensen (Public Relations Officer)

## b) Membership/Website – Vern Racz Vern Racz, Keith Head, Dennis Ewanus

**Website**: The website continues to be improved and added to with both Keith and Dennis being heavily involved. Empty Saddles and other news regarding the college past and present continues to grow. The capability of the website to handle on line sales of the Sodbusters book, memberships, and most importantly Reunion tickets has significantly improved our efficiency in dealing with the membership and others. The committee has spent endless hours not only individually but meeting with Steve Dawes our webmaster. The committee having now successfully completed one full year looks forward to these tasks being less onerous. Louis Bossaer manages our twitter and Facebook accounts attached to our website and has proven to be a quick and easy way to provide news to those using these accounts.

Our sincere thanks for all their hard work.

**Membership**: As of November, 15, 2017 we had 1948 members in SAGA. This number has not changed over the last several years with acquisition being approximately equal to attrition even though college graduate numbers have increased. The SAGA executive has tried through hosting events at Agribition and Summer agriculture events to promote membership and at college events such as breakfasts at exam time and sponsorship of ASA events. The name change, and recognition of the greater diversity of graduates should be of help in this regard of increasing memberships. This diversity is the new reality.

The aspect of maintaining membership lists on the website continues to be a popular way to confidentially allow members to contact other members on a voluntary basis. In short, we are continuing to look at ways of increasing membership and SAGA's relevance to its membership. Suggestions are always welcome. The name change, and avenue for scholarship gifting will be paramount in this regard.

Comment at meeting: SAGA is at approximately 2000 membership but we need to keep in mind that we are graduating more students but not getting more members.

#### c) Hockey - Billy Brown

The 2017 SAGA Hockey Tournament once again took place in Waldheim on January 7<sup>th</sup> and was originally supposed to consist of a 7 team draw, but there was a last minute drop out. This resulted in a quick adjustment to a 6 team tournament which included 4 returning Alumni teams and 2 Undergrad teams.

#### Results

In a repeat of last year, the A-side final saw NE Deep Banders (Brandon Smith, '15) going up against Schmidt's Sticks (Steve Schmidt, '00). In the end, the NE Deep Banders were able to keep the dream alive and win two years in a row.

The B-side saw Long Shifts Short Shafts (Mitch Bond, '14) going up against the old timers Sticks out for Harambe (Royce Lodoen, '12) with the young guns, Long Shifts Short Shafts coming out on top.

The final revenue from the tournament was \$1042.00

### d) Newsletter - Ewald Lammerding

2017 was a good year for Saga in regards to costs of publishing. For the first time we had three advertisers for both editions. These fees of \$800, along with the continued efforts of Vern Racz and Tanya Napper of the AgBio Development Office to whittle our hard copy mailing list, kept our costs for 2017 below 2016 even though the actual costs of printing and mailing rose again.

Both the June and December issues had excellent stories and articles from members. Thanks in particular to Irene Ahner for the narrative of her Prairie Chicken, Les Henry for his Soil Science History and Bob Mckercher for his visit with Harold Chapman. Blair Cummins and Louis Bossaer did another great job expanding our presence at the 3 Saskatchewan Ag shows, then supplying The SAGA with comments and pictures.

And we would like to thank Carson Jorgenson, the ASA-SAGA Liaison, for his excellent contribution to the Dec. issue. It was a wide-ranging and informative piece that showed us just how busy students are these days with so many extra-curricular activities.

Thanks to Dean Mary Buhr and Hamish Tulloch for keeping our membership informed and up-to-date with how the College of Ag Bio is expanding its already sizable footprint, and that our Alumni continue to be the best donators at the U of S.

But, we still need to hear more from our Alumni. We want to share the successes of our members with ALL of our members, and that means you sending us the stories, the information, or at least an email pointing us towards a source.

## e) Banquet/Reunion - Ewald Lammerding

The 2017 Reunion/Banquet ran into several snags, some of our own doing, some caused by forces beyond our control {at the time}. Darcy Jones was bed-ridden by that nasty flu/cold of last year, plus a terrible case of laryngitis. However, Raelene Petracek did an excellent job jumping in, delegating and saving our bacon so that we got off with just a few hitches. Vern and Dennis and their wives kept the front table under firm control so that when members came they were quickly processed.

Two particular problems we created ourselves. We were introducing three HLM's instead of the usual two, and we did not control our timing. We did get through that, but in so doing, we did not have time to properly introduce all the Honor years, the efforts by the various Chairs, our oldest classes and the older SAGA members in attendance. The other was that we had too many latecomers, who had not purchased Banquet tickets previous to the deadline, show up. There were several members who had bought tickets but could not attend due to the flu/cold; we tried to make the numbers work, but we lost track. Therefore we were in excess of the numbers we had given TCU, plus their 2% extra of food. So we must make sure we do not allow any stragglers in. They have a ticket or they have to go home, unless previous arrangements have been made.

Unfortunately, the most complaints concerned the meal itself. Darcy had arranged for 3 buffet tables, but the new Chef at TCU arbitrarily decided to use only two. Our mistake was taking his word for this; hence the last members were still in the food lines when we began our program. The dinner supplied also left much to be desired; some of the chicken was leather, too much pasta salad and not near enough green. The worst however, was running out of beef. The TCU Chef used a 2/3 - 1/3 split on the entrees, instead of the customary 3/4 - 1/4. We received a \$200 discount on the bill due to these meal errors on behalf of TCU Place. We have held extensive talks with TCU staff, and hope that we will have corrected any future problems.

On the bright side, Imagery Photography did another excellent job. Second year in a row without a complaint. The Mixer proceeded on time. Louis Bossaer had connected with Black Fox Distillery, Nine Mile Legacy and Living Sky Winery to let us sample their wares. This new function was very well received, as in, we drank them dry in very short order. We plan to do the same this year. We will have tables set up to sell Sodbusters and Forever Young books, plus tables for the ASA to sell Agro paraphernalia. We'll even have some Voc Ag of yore yearbooks.

For the future, in 2019 we will move to the basement and make use of the Centennial Halls. This area is preferable to the main floor Gallery. We hold the first ask for the years 2019, 20 and 21. Imagery Photography is already booked for those years.

## f) Sask. Agricultural Hall of Fame – Bryan Harvey

The Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame is now well established in its new format. Membership is now open to individuals or organizations with an interest in agriculture. Membership is now over thirty and growing. A board is elected from the membership at large and the current Chair is Reed Andrews, ably assisted by Beth Herzog the staff administrator. In addition to the structural changes two other changes have been made the induction ceremony is now being held in April instead of the August long weekend and in 2018 it will be April 21<sup>st</sup> at the Western Development Museum. The other change is in the announcement of the new inductees at a separate event. Past practice was to announce them at Agribition and Crop Production week. This year the announcement was made on January 4<sup>th</sup> at the WDM. This year's inductees are as follows:

- Joan Heath a producer from Radisson active with the Saskatchewan Canola Growers,

• Vern Racz (UofS BSA 1968, M.Sc. 1971) an animal nutritionist involved with the Western Feed Grains Centre and the Feed Test laboratory.

### h) Past President's Report - Louis Bossaer

## i) Vice President's Report – Mayson Maerz

In the Vice President role my primary focus has been to ensure Reunion chairs were found early; that they understood and accepted the role to organize their classmates; and to assist Tanya Napper in the Alumni Office communicate the various aspects of the Weekend to these Chairs.

Between Tanya, Ewald Lammerding (SAGA Editor/Banquet) and myself we were able to secure thirteen chairs by October 01, leaving five of the Reunion Years vacant. Subsequently one of these vacancies were filled (1963S) unbeknownst to myself, leaving four. Of these, three represent our most recent graduate years, 2013 and 2008S classes. This is an area of concern, and we as an organization must continue to engage the newest graduates. I would like to recognize Tanya for her invaluable organizational skills and support in helping communicate with the Reunion Chairs. As of writing this report we have 337 Banquet registrations in the system.

Secondary focus has been growing our social media reach, specifically on the Twitter application. Goal has been to connect with the newer grads on a platform they identify with. Louis Bossaer, Past President, initiated the account and to date we have grown to 542 followers. It is safe to say 90% are U of S Ag and Bioresources graduates and undergraduates. The approach has been promotional with a light-hearted bent (we 'broadcast' from the 'Infirmary') linking to as many of our outreach projects as possible (ex: Cheers w/Peers events, Reunion activities, etc).

Thirdly, as Vice President I have been participating in College events when the President has been unable to. This included a Welcome to the Graduates at the January 2017 College Graduation ceremonies, as well as representing SAGA at the 2017 Been Feed.

Lastly as Vice-President I have begun the search for my replacement, with limited success. I am currently in discussion with two candidates who are hesitant to jump in.

RESOLUTIONS TO BE CONSIDERED AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of THE SASKATCHEWAN AGRICULTURAL GRANDUATES' ASSOCIATION INC., JANUARY 6, 2018

Whereas, The College of Agriculture and Bioresources offers undergraduate degrees in Agriculture, Agribusiness, Animal Bioscience, and Renewable Resource Management, along with four diploma programs and two certificate programs; and,

Whereas, The Saskatchewan Agricultural Graduates' Association recognizes this diversity and wishes to accommodate all graduates of the College of Agriculture and Bioresources;

Resolved, That the Saskatchewan Agricultural Graduates' Association Inc. amend Constitution Article 1. Name, by striking out "THE SASKATCHEWAN AGRICULTURAL GRADUATES' ASSOCIATION INC." and inserting "THE SASKATCHEWAN AGRICULTURE AND BIORESOURCES GRADUATES' ASSOCIATION INC."

Whereas, The original SAGA logo of the Saskatchewan Agricultural Graduates' Association has historical significance, is well recognized, and is the banner of the Newsletter;

*Resolved*, That, if the resolution to amend **Constitution Article 1. Name**, is carried, The Saskatchewan Agriculture and Bioresources Graduates' Association Inc. retain the original SAGA logo.

**MOTION: That SAGA approve the above Resolution on the name change.** Vern Racz, Jacqueline Taves. Motion defeated (see below)

Discussion followed around the reasons for the name change of the College of Ag & Biosources, actual agriculture content of the curriculum, reasons that the SAGA executive thought the name change would help include all students and increase membership.

Following the discussion the following motion was put forth:

MOTION: That the name change decision be tabled for one year. Irene Ahner, no seconder – MOTION FAILED.

**Question** called on motion for name change: results: 17 in favour, 13 opposed – **MOTION DEFEATED** (2/3 required). This rendered the second part of the Resolution redundant.
