SAGA (originally named The Saskatchewan Agricultural College Graduates' Association) was established in 1935!

Grant and Chantal Devine


Donald Grant Devine '67 C was born in 1944 in Regina, and was raised on his grandfather's farm near Lake Valley. After earning his degree from the U of S he completed his MSc, Agricultural Economics from the University of Alberta in 1970, before attaining his PhD in Agricultural Economics from Ohio State University in 1976. Grant taught agricultural marketing and consumer economics at U of S from 1976-79, focusing on food retailing, grain handling and agricultural marketing efficiencies.

He served as the 11th Premier of Saskatchewan from 1982 to 1991, concurrently serving as agriculture minister; his passion for agriculture evident throughout his career. He brought forward policies that supported the industry through challenging production years, such as guaranteed loans to young farmers and province wide natural gas. He championed innovation and science, establishing Ag-West Bio to lead work on biotechnology, while the province's Agriculture Development Fund began during his tenure to advance agricultural research. His dedication and leadership led to a new College of Agriculture building at the University of Saskatchewan, which has become one of the leading agriculture colleges in Canada. His work on free trade, including a Canada-U.S. free trade agreement, was significant for Saskatchewan farmers and Canadian agriculture.

He led the charge on having Farm Credit Canada Corporation locate its head office in Regina, providing hundreds of jobs to the Saskatchewan economy. He was also instrumental to the province's investment in SaskFerco, with the urea and anhydrous ammonia fertilizer plant a first for Canada.

He has held a number of directorships and executive positions and has continued to use his experience as a farmer, researcher, economist and director to serve the agriculture community.

He currently has a farm and ranch near Moose Jaw. Grant and Chantal have been married for 58 years and have 5 children, 18 grandchildren and 1 great grand-daughter.



Marlene and Kevin Hursh

Kevin Hursh '80 C was born at Cabri, Saskatchewan and grew up on a nearby mixed family farm. He graduated with distinction from U of S, College of Agriculture, serving as Ag Student Association President and Senior Stick in his final year.

Following graduation, his first and only real job was with CFQC Radio and Television in Saskatoon. Eventually, his farm news coverage was province wide. He worked for 15 years doing farm news, establishing a weekly half hour show called Farmgate and doing daily noon hour farm news. He left CTV in 1995 and together with his wife Marlene established Hursh Consulting & Communications based in Saskatoon. Through the years, Kevin has served as executive director of the Inland Terminal Association of Canada (ITAC), the Canary Seed Development Commission of Saskatchewan and Sask Mustard. As a founding director and then executive director of the Canary Seed Development Commission, Kevin played a key role in obtaining human food approval for the crop.

Kevin and Marlene handled communications and promotional work for Crop Production Week in Saskatoon for 17 years.

Kevin and Marlene also own and operate the family farm near Cabri, growing a wide variety of crops including kabuli chickpeas, large green lentils, maple peas, brown mustard and Canary seed. Their three sons help out on the farm as their careers allow.

For more than 40 years, Kevin has written a weekly column, which for many years has been published in *The Western Producer*. He has also written for other farm publications and can often be heard on Saskatchewan radio stations. In his opinion pieces and speaking engagements, he strives to express what farmers need to hear, not necessarily what they want to hear.

Marlene and Kevin are proud of their Honorary Lifetime Membership bestowed by the Saskatchewan Seed Growers Association and their Lifetime Achievement Award from the Canadian Farm Writers Federation.

In 2021, Kevin received a Distinguished Agrologist Award from the Saskatchewan Institute of Agrologists and in 2023, he was inducted into the Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame.

Kevin and Marlene are blessed with four grandchildren.

SAGA Honorary Life Members 2026 Nominees

Maurice Delage '69 C received his BSA from the University of Saskatchewan in 1969 and MSc in 1978. Throughout his career he has been a leader, a visionary and an innovator in agriculture in Saskatchewan and across Canada. His efforts led to major advancements in the areas of crop protection and seed development for producers. Maurice's contributions to agriculture and society have been recognized with inductions into the Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame and Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame and awarding of the Saskatchewan Order of Merit. He currently is involved in family's 35,000 acre grain farm, growing canola, wheat, peas and lentils. Delage Farms is located just north of Indian Head, SK.

Larry White '64 C obtained his BSA from the University of Saskatchewan in 1964. Throughout his career with Saskatchewan Agriculture, Larry was an exemplary leader, manager and communicator. He began his career as an Agricultural Representative in Watson, advancing to Regional Manager, first in Weyburn, then Prince Albert. When Larry retired from Sask. Agriculture and Food he joined the Saskatchewan Forest Centre and made contributions to the agroforestry industry. He also was instrumental in helping the Conservation Learning Centre develop a long term strategic plan, which helped renew the Centre and contributed to its recent success. Larry's outstanding service and worthy contributions to agriculture have been recognized when he was awarded the SIA Distinguished Agrologist Award in 2011.

A Word from the Dean

Greetings fellow alumni!

Spring has finally arrived in Saskatchewan, in fits and starts as is typical for the Prairies. I'm writing this during the busy final exam season, as students wrap up their studies for the term and get ready to head out to whatever their summers bring – back to the farm, out to the field for their summer jobs, or maybe starting their new careers. I'm already getting excited for spring convocation, which is such a highlight of being dean: seeing the wave of emotions our newly-minted alumni experience as they cross the stage and congratulating them on their accomplishments.

Spring is a season of new growth and new beginnings, and there has been much of that in AgBio this year! We have four new faculty members in 2025: Dr. Anže Švara has joined Plant Sciences, where he will be teaching in the horticulture area and developing his research program on fruit genetics and improvement. Dr. Flavia van Cleef has a cross-appointment with the departments of Plant Sciences and Animal and Poultry Science, as the new Beef Industry Integrated Forage Management and Utilization Chair. Dr. Chantel Chizen (PhD 2024) has joined Soil Science in the area of Digital Pedology and Pedometrics. Dr. Kwabena Nketia has joined Plant Sciences and will be focused on Precision Agronomy. Drs. Chizen and Nketia are both part of the cluster hire in the area of Sustainable and Digital Agriculture that I mentioned in my message last fall. More information about each of these faculty members can be found on their individual profile pages at agbio.usask.ca. Two new faculty members are scheduled to start in Agricultural and Resource Economics this summer (more to come on them later) and there are three additional searches underway, including the new Saskatchewan Wheat Development

Commission Applied Genomics and Pre-breeding Chair.

You may also have seen the announcement in February regarding Nutrien's \$15 million donation to the University of Saskatchewan, over 75% of which is going to support initiatives here in the College of Agriculture and Bioresources. These include establishing the Nutrien Centre for Sustainable and Digital Agriculture here in AgBio, providing student scholarships, supporting the activities of the kihci okâwîmâw askiy (Great Mother Earth) Knowledge Centre, and establishing the Nutrien Future Fund. We are excited to put this gift to work, creating more opportunities for our AgBio community and those we serve!

Finally, with summer on the horizon, I'm happy to share that I have been renewed for a second term as the Dean of Agriculture and Bioresources! It's been an honor to serve this community and share our stories on so many platforms and stages across Canada and around the world. I can't wait to see where we go next as we continue growing our future!

On April 26, 2025 six distinguished individuals were officially inducted into the Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame during a ceremony held at Prairieland Park. Among the honorees was Robert (Bob) Bohrs, a highly regarded fruit breeder and retired faculty member from the Department of Plant Sciences. Bob played a pivotal role in the development of nine sour cherry and ten haskap varieties and was instrumental in promoting the commercialization of these fruits across Canada. The 2025 inductees also include:

- Harold Martens (deceased) former MLA, senior government official, rancher, and board member of multiple livestock associations

60-year Reunion of the '65 College Class

Eleven members plus some spouses of the '65 C class spent a very enjoyable weekend together at the 90th Ag Grad Reunion, January 10-11, 2025. Elsewhere in this newsletter there are reports on the details of the reunion with its change of venue, meals and presentations.

When I sent the original information for our January Reunion, I eventually received replies from most of our remaining classmates. Some were in such poor health that it was impossible for them to attend. Others did not want to be in Saskatoon at that time of year because its history of cold weather and piles of snow. I wish to report that, yes, Saskatoon had a lot of snow and it turned quite cold by Sunday but none of us who attended had any major problems.

In 1961, there were over 100 students in the first-year class of the College of Agriculture. The usual attrition occurred so when I joined this class in 1962, there were 80 male faces taking note. They were not all strangers due to high school, 4-H and co-op school events.

There were 44 of us who convocated in May 1965. This number included students from previous years who needed an extra year or two. Some of our own class convocated a year or two later. We have been a class who have faithfully taken part in our reunions at ten-year intervals though there has never been 100% attendance. Over the years we have been saddened by the passing of several classmates. The class pictures taken each decade have become invaluable keepsakes. For the past two reunions we have included spouses in the pictures, even if the grad is no longer able to join us.

Our class began the weekend with the Friday event at the Agriculture Building, taking part in the tours, greeting old friends and finding new ones. We then adjourned to the hotel across from the WDM for a class supper, storytelling and taking pictures. Jim & Eileen Ewart were able to join us that evening but did not stay for Saturday, so they don't appear in this year's picture. We were very pleased to have Gillian McDougald join us. Allan is no longer able to be out.

Bridging the Gap: Why One Ag Grad is Speaking **Up for Modern Farming**

Dennis Bulani '78 C has spent a lifetime farming the land near Biggar, Saskatchewan – and like many of us, he's watched the public conversation about agriculture grow increasingly disconnected from the realities on the ground.

"People still trust farmers," Dennis says, "but they don't trust how we farm."

That troubling contradiction is what led Dennis to write his new book, What A Farmer Wants You to Know About Food, released earlier this year. In it, he tackles the hot-button issues - from GMOs to seed oils to pesticides – with a grounded, science-first perspective. But this isn't a technical manual. It's a farmer's invitation to the table. "I wanted to create something for the chief grocery shopper of the household. Something they could use to feel more confident about what's on their plates - and maybe even understand our work a little better."

The timing is urgent. According to the Canadian Centre for Food Integrity's 2024 report, only 18% of Canadians have a high level of trust in farmers, and fewer than a third think the food system is on the right track. "That's a wake-up call," says Dennis. "And it tells me we've got work to do."

The Courage to Speak Up

Dennis knows firsthand how hard it can be to engage in conversations about farming with non-farmers. "It's like turning the key on an old engine," he admits. "you're hoping it starts smooth, but you're bracing for a backfire." But he's quick to point out that confidence isn't about having all the answers - it's about showing up with pride in what we do.

In fact, he believes that's something every ag grad can lean into: "If we want people to trust us, they need to see that we trust ourselves. Our pride in the way we farm can be contagious."

Small Starts, **Big Impact**

Dennis isn't asking grads to jump into debates or social media firestorms. Instead, he suggests starting small: "Think of two or three stories from your own operation. Maybe it's how you've reduced chemical use with precision spraying. Maybe it's how no-till has protected your soil. Then practice telling those stories in casual conversations - with a neighbour, a friend, someone at the rink."

And if you need a little help building your confidence? "Check out TrustYourPlate.com. We built it as a resource hub for farmers and consumers alike – with facts, quotes, and stories to support open, honest conversations. We're also active on Facebook, Instagram and X - search for Trust Your Plate!"

Dennis's message to fellow alumni is clear: "We can't wait for someone else to tell our story. If we don't speak up, who will?"

The time to pull up a chair is now – who are you going to invite to your table?

"If we want people to trust us, they need to see that we trust ourselves. Our pride in the way we farm can be contagious.

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The Be What the World Needs fundraising campaign means more than donations

With the university's *Be What the World Needs* comprehensive campaign's \$500,000,000 fundraising goal now reached, and its wrap-up event fast approaching (June 18) – it's reasonable to ask how the college faired in this endeavour.

As context, fundraising in the world of advanced education follows a standardized accounting methodology, which allows for counting certain gifts that haven't yet been realized such as pledges and some planned bequests. Also, campaigns of this scale don't just launch and go; they build momentum through a "quiet" phase and the campaign publicly launched two years ago with \$322 million already counted.

Within this framework AgBio did remarkably well. We contributed significantly more to the campaign's total than any other academic unit – raising more than twice that of every other college except Medicine. How were we so successful? I believe the answer has everything to do with who we are, what we've prioritized and how we go about our mission.

Our teaching and research activities are critically important to some of the most pressing global challenges – and the campaign helped a wider audience become more aware of this. Then there's our community. As a natural practice, we've fostered many exceptionally strong industry and personal relationships. We also have some unique funding opportunities through producer organizations. And it certainly helps that collaboration is in our DNA, which means a lot when moving from opportunity to realized gift.

Throughout the campaign, donors found many ways to support us. To highlight a few examples, gifts have helped new facilities get built, expanded our research infrastructure, grown our faculty complement, funded numerous awards, established a centre for digital agriculture, built capacity to fund our *kihciokâwîmâw askiy* (Great Mother Earth) Knowledge Centre, and expanded our research lands.
