Summer road trips and Agro roots

Summer is the time for road trips and this year I took the opportunity to explore family history. I grew up in Calgary, but both of my grandmothers were from the Fort Qu'Appelle / Cupar area. When my dad visited from Calgary, we decided to check out his family history and I learned that my Agro roots go way back!

We started at the Cupar & District Museum, an amazing place which has clearly been a labour of love for museum volunteers of curating history and artifacts. My dad and I spent a lot of time looking through the history books, learning about my (paternal) grandmother's family. Her maiden name was "Scott" and her younger brother was **Duncan Scott '43 C**, who went on to be a professor in soil science in Iowa. We figured out how we were related to the Scotts of Cupar, who have an even longer Agro history! I've emailed a few times with **Chad Scott '17 C**, one of the SAGA hockey tournament organizers, but we've never met and now I know that Chad is a cousin! His brother **Matthew '16 C**, his dad **Michael '95 C** and his grandfather, **Leonard '51 C** are all proud Agros. On my side of the Scott tree, the Agro tradition continues another generation with our son **Carter '21 AgBio** (my husband **Mark** is also an **Agro, '88 C**).

After stopping in Cupar, we headed south to find an Old Stone House that we had seen referenced in the history books and that my dad remembers visiting as a young boy when he came to visit his grandparents. It took some searching, but we found it in surprisingly good condition for a home built in 1900. It was built for my (and Chad and Matthew's) great-great grandfather John Scott. The Cupar history book indicates, "Stones were brought to the site by young men from miles around in exchange for a promise by Mr. Scott of a supper and dance once the house was completed". It made me think that some things haven't changed, it still takes a community to get things done. It was a beautiful August day when we did this road trip, lots of harvest activity going on, and a chance for my dad to share stories about his grandparents.

This newsletter may find you preparing for Christmas, perhaps to spend time with family. From our family to yours, many blessings and best wishes for 2025.

Honorary Life Member 2025 – Kevin Hursh

Kevin Hursh '80C graduated with distinction from the College of Agriculture serving as Ag Student Association President and Senior Stick in his final year. Following graduation, he worked for 15 years doing farm news for CTV in Saskatchewan, establishing a weekly half hour show called Farmgate. Kevin and his wife Marlene run Hursh Consulting & Communications based in Saskatoon. Through the years, Kevin has served as executive director of the Inland Terminal Association of Canada (ITAC), the Canary Seed Development Commission of Saskatchewan and Sask Mustard. Kevin and Marlene handled communications work for Crop Production Week for many years. Kevin and Marlene also own and operate a farm near Cabri in southwest Saskatchewan growing a wide variety of crops including chickpeas, large green lentils, maple peas, brown mustard and Canary seed. For more than 40 years, Kevin has written a weekly column, which for many years has been published in The Western Producer. He has also written for other farm publications and can often be heard on Saskatchewan radio stations. In 2021. Kevin received a Distinguished Agrologist Award from the Saskatchewan Institute of Agrologists. In 2023, Kevin was inducted into the Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame.


Honorary Life Member 2025 – Grant Devine

Donald Grant Devine '67 C was born in 1944 in Regina and was raised on his grandfather's farm near Lake Valley. After earning his degree from the University of Saskatchewan, he completed his Master's in Agricultural Economics from the University of Alberta in 1970, before attaining his PhD in Agricultural Economics from Ohio State University in 1976. Grant taught agricultural marketing and consumer economics at the University of Saskatchewan from 1976-79. From 1982-91 he served as the Premier of Saskatchewan, while also holding the agriculture portfolio. While in these roles several agricultural policy initiatives were implemented such as reducing interest rates for farmers and homeowners, introducing the Net Income Stabilization Account and Gross Revenue Insurance Programs and creating Ag-West Bio Inc., the first biotechnology industrygovernment association in Canada. Grant was involved in the NAFTA negotiations between Canada, United States and Mexico and was a leading advocate for the fundraising to build the new College of AgBio building on the U of S Campus. He currently serves on the Land and Facilities and Finance and Investment committees of the Board of Governors at the U of S and has a farm and ranch near Moose Jaw.

Dr. Rex Newkirk, '92 C, '95 MSc, '02 PhD and his wife Kathy-Jo had the experience of a lifetime this summer as they watched their daughter Shelby compete at the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games. Unable to attend her first Paralympics in Tokyo due to Covid restrictions that banned fans, the Newkirks were finally able to experience the games in person. The venue was a rugby stadium where they installed a temporary pool to accommodate the large number of fans in attendance. Every day was a sold-out crowd with 15,000+ fans at every session! If you were following the news, you will already know that Shelby hit the podium on the final night of competition, winning bronze in the 100m backstroke – S6 classification. A monumental moment for the whole family to be proud of.

Julie Kozun '22 AgBio, is a member of the Canadian Sitting Volleyball team, that won bronze at the Paris 2024 Paralympic games. They were the first team from Canada to win a medal, in this sport.

Aaron Higgins, son of Rose and **Doug Higgins '85** C, won four medals in the 2023 Special Olympics World Summer Games in Berlin, Germany – silver in squat, silver in bench press, bronze in deadlift and silver overall. Aaron was also recently inducted into the Regina Sports Hall of Fame.

Current state of agriculture in Ukraine

Russia's war against Ukraine continues with no end in sight. Ukraine concentrates on destroying Russia's means to wage war, while Russia concentrates on destroying infrastructure, cultural institutions and the Ukrainian people.

By the end of 2023, the Ukrainian agricultural sector had sustained an estimated US\$80 billion in damages and losses. Rebuilding Ukraine's agriculture is expected to cost US\$56.1 billion and demining will cost an additional US\$32 billion. Russia also blockaded Ukrainian agricultural exports. The Black Sea Initiative and the more recent Ukrainian Corridor have helped to keep Ukraine's economy afloat and avert a wider global food security crisis.

The Black Sea Grain Initiative of 2022 lasted one year before Russia reneged on it. Military success in the Black Sea allowed Ukraine, in August 2023, to create the Ukrainian corridor, a "safe route" through Turkish, Bulgarian, Romanian, and Ukrainian territorial waters. Export volumes by the late fall of 2023 had rebounded significantly. The new shipping route is open to all exports and imports. The improved security situation in Ukrainian territorial waters was decisive for this success, along with an innovative solution to reduce the risks of insuring ships carrying Ukrainian products.

By reducing Ukrainian grain exports, Russia is blackmailing the global community with the real possibility of creating famine in other countries. Due to attacks on grain and port infrastructure, many African and Asian countries that relied on Ukrainian grain are now at risk. Russia has promised to replace Ukrainian grain and provide free grain as well to these countries.

While countries in the Middle East and North Africa area (MENA, including Turkey) remain large markets for Ukraine, the share of exports has dropped from 53% to 34% over these same periods. The largest impact to wheat exports has been felt by Sub-Saharan Africa, which fell from 10% to 3% and South and Southeast Asia, which fell from 30% to 12%.

Russia is intent in replacing Ukrainian grain exports with their own grain and currying favour with African nations to support them against the West (shades of the Cold War). Russian wheat production over the past two marketing seasons has been at a record high due to record plantings and yields. The USDA estimates that Russian wheat exports will likely be a record-high 51 MMT for the 2023-24 marketing year.

Russia accounts for a large share of global exports of fertilizer components such as potash, urea, diammonium phosphate and anhydrous ammonia. Market prices for these commodities spiked after the invasion in February 2022. This puts at risk those countries trying to boost their own grain production.


On September 11, 2024, a Saint Kitts and Nevis-flagged bulk carrier was struck by a Russian-launched missile after leaving the Ukrainian port of Chornomorsk in the Odesa region. There were no casualties as the missile failed to explode. It was the first time a missile has struck a civilian vessel transporting grains at sea since the start of the invasion in February 2022. Some vessels have been damaged during Russian attacks on Ukrainian ports where they were moored.

Unpacking AgBio's Success Adaptability, resiliency and trust in what we do

My office houses a small collection of materials from the college's past – things like graduation booklets dating back to the 1950's, a collection of convocation guides, a handful of the Greystone yearbooks – it's surprising what these illuminate on closer examination.


Hunting for something in this collection, I came across a program guide for Bean Feed from 1991. This was the year I graduated, which may be why it caught my attention. I was struck by the size, format and page layout – it's the same as we follow today. How little things change (or so I initially thought). But comparing the current and old programs, a different picture emerges. Each booklet opens with an overview of the evening's activities followed by a number of pages devoted to award descriptions. The most striking difference between the older and current booklet is the thickness. Back in 1991, it took just 5 pages to summarize the scholarships. Now 24 pages are needed for these descriptions. I counted 19 individual scholarships in the 1991 booklet. Last year's Bean Feed program had 104. In both guides, the award names recognize a mix of organizations and individuals – more than half of the scholarships given out in 1991 were established by companies and industry groups - today more than 90% of our scholarships were established by people. Of the organizations associated with the awards in 1991, very few exist today. All of the ag companies listed in the 1991 booklet are gone now (either wound up or merged). Only one of the organizational awards (the Saskatchewan Institute of Agrologists Scholarship) is still active. Interestingly, the awards named for people in the 1991 guide have demonstrated considerably more staying-power – almost all still exist.

These observations got me thinking about some of the other changes that have occurred at the college over the years. One of the most significant is our growth. This academic year the college has over 1,700 students, of which approximately 80% are undergrads. Although not a recent change, the proportion of women in our programs is quite different from the pre-1990s. These days the undergrads are about 64% female. To put this in some context, the only colleges that attract more women are nursing, dentistry, education, veterinary medicine, and pharmacy & nutrition.

The college's programs have also evolved over the years. There are now 16 majors that can be chosen to pursue a bachelor's degree. Of these, Agronomy, Animal Science, Animal Bioscience and Agribusiness currently make up more than 60% of our undergraduate students. Horticulture, which was my major, has moved from the fringes to have

more students than Crop Science. Another major shift in the college's undergraduate programs involves our social science offerings. Once exclusively represented by Agricultural Economics degrees, the introduction of the Agribusiness program began to draw a whole new cohort of students from less traditional backgrounds.

I believe these changes say something about the college's resiliency and adaptability. We seem to have a natural ability to recognize emerging needs and capitalize on new opportunities. Observe that students are looking for a more direct path to become veterinarians – offer a program to do that and more. Identify a gap between Ag Econ and our science focussed majors – enter the Ag Business program to fill it. Witness crop production technologies advance at breakneck speed – welcome to the Precision Ag Certificate. Experience the transitory nature of industry support – be something that real people care about. And that, at the college's core, may be the secret to our success.



Letter from a Prairie Chicken

My story this time is going to be a memorial for two of our departed old friends, both SAGA members and supporters.

Our classmate, **Jerry Knipfel '65** C, M.Sc., Ph.D., left us on April 11, after many successful years in Swift Current. He was a long-time researcher at the Canada Agriculture Research Station. He and his family established a tree nursery and park from a bare hillside a few miles east of Swift Current. He was also a very active community member. On June 30, the family hosted a celebration of life for him at Merivale Nursery in their house yard. Nine members plus some spouses of the '65 C class travelled from Calgary, Maple Creek, Rosetown, Saskatoon, North Battleford and Lloydminster to be part of all the remembering. The family provided an hour of remembrances plus an excellent video of Jerry's life and accomplishments. Later some of us gathered for supper to continue telling college stories.

One of my stories for SAGA last year was about **Lloyd Redick '49 S**, who had returned to his roots in Maple Creek in 2022. He was raised in our home community, close to the Ahners. He was a wealth of information about his early years and his working life with the PFRA and the Water Survey of Canada. He was devoted to SAGA and rarely missed a reunion.

Lloyd was 94 on January 13, 2024. I made sure that I took home a 75 Year Ribbon for him from our reunion. It was hung proudly in the hall picture case outside his room. The grads were reminded that attending reunions would be enjoyable experiences.

A Tribute to Les Henry: Keeping soils and water on the front burner

A highly respected and influential soil and water scientist, SAGA Honorary Life Member, influencer and mentor. Les Henry '64 C, passed from our midst in June of this year. Les was a farm boy from Milden, he completed his undergraduate and graduate degrees at the University of Saskatchewan College of Agriculture in the 1960's. He joined the Soil Science Department in 1968, becoming full professor in the Department of Soil Science and the Extension Division in 1980. Les received many awards and accolades over the years for his contributions in soil fertility, soil salinity and water management research, teaching and extension including among others. He was recognized with fellowships with Agriculture Institute of Canada, Honorary Life memberships with Canadian Society of Extension and Saskatchewan Agriculture Graduates Association, induction into the Saskatchewan Agriculture Hall of Fame and an honorary Doctor of Laws from the University of Saskatchewan at spring convocation in 2022.

Les was a keen advocate of getting the right message out there front and foremost to the students, growers, industry and the scientific community end users. He did this throughout his career at the University of Saskatchewan as professor in introductory and advanced soil science classes, as a writer for Grainews magazine, a presenter at all variety of outreach venues across the prairies and at scientific workshops like Soils and Crops, and by serving on the executive of organizations like SAGA and SIA. Les was also a great friend of the Agricultural Students' Association in the College of Agriculture and Bioresources. In the Soil Science department, we all appreciated the

insight that Les brought to the research issues and questions of the day that faculty and graduate students were addressing. Les asked the "hard" questions that made us think about how and why we were doing what we were doing. Invariably this academic interest and debate led to better, more relevant research studies being conducted.

The wellbeing of the farming community was a high priority for Prof. Henry. Every fall up to his passing, Les would come to visit with myself and others who were actively engaged in farming to find out how things had turned out in the farming season. The genuine interest in fostering agriculture development that Les displayed was truly impressive, travelling nearly every mile of main road and highway in Saskatchewan!

Les was an inspiration for my own activities in extension and provided me with much sage advice over the years that greatly helped me. Know Your Audience, Don't Be Afraid to Say You Don't Know, Stored Soil Moisture is Money in the Bank, Carry a Spare Bulb for the Projector are just a few short

ones that come to mind! Les integrated much of his knowledge into "Henry's Handbook of Soil and Water" which I think is a "must have" on every soil scientist and agronomist's shelf. An impressive collection of slides and reports from his extensive field research was also amassed by Les over the years, showing and describing crop responses to fertilization and other management practices. Les carefully organized these and many other unique documents following his retirement so that I and others could use them into the future, and many are still used in my own teaching and extension work. I was very honored to receive in April of this year the inaugural Les Henry Soil and Water Award established by Les. Les was an exceptional mentor, colleague and friend that we all greatly miss.

The SAGA Scholarship was first awarded in 2019, a concerted effort by former Membership Chair Vern Racz '68 C. The Scholarship is fully funded by ag grad contributions and SAGA.
