Honorary Life Member -Dr. Fran Walley

Dr. Fran Walley '93 Ph.D is the recently retired Associate Dean (Academic) in the College of Agriculture and Bioresources, and Professor Emerita in the Department of Soil Science at the University of Saskatchewan.

Fran grew up just one mile away from the University of Manitoba and dreamed of becoming a vet. As luck would have it, the U of M required pre-vets to take a soil science class taught by **Bob Soper**, '53 C & '55 MSC, distinguished Graduate of the University of Saskatchewan. She was entirely hooked on soils from that point on.

Dr. Walley obtained her BSc and MSc from the U of M; then earned her Ph.D in soil microbiology from the U of S. She began her career as an Assistant Professor & Extension Specialist at a time when pulse crops were becoming widely adopted on the prairies. Her extension experience with farmers sparked an active research program in the area of soil nitrogen dynamics and pulse crop agronomy.

Fran is author or co-author of more than 65 peer reviewed journal articles and book chapters and has supervised/co-supervised more than 30 graduate and post doc students. Dr. Walley has long been involved in teaching introductory soil science and was particularly proud to share her love of soil science and the College of AgBio with her students.

Honorary Life Member -Janice Tranberg

Janice Tranberg's ('94 C) path to a career in agriculture began in rural Saskatchewan where she was raised, first around Balgonie and then at Big River. She was drawn to plants and obtained a horticulture diploma from Olds College.

Eventually, her love of science led her "back home" to the University of Saskatchewan, where she received her degree, followed by a MSc. ('98) in molecular biology and plant pathology.

She started working in the "new and really cool" biotechnology sector with Performance Plants, then moved to Ag-West Bio, CropLife Canada, the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture and finally became the Executive Director of Sask Canola. Her broadreaching career in Saskatchewan and Alberta has always involved the ag sector where her interests expanded to policy development, regulatory affairs and government relations.

Since 2018, Janice has been the dual president and CEO of both the National and Alberta Cattle Feeders Association and is now based in Calgary. Her focus has been on supporting beef producers and advocating for the cattle industry as it dealt with the many unforeseen impacts of COVID.

She finds that working collaboratively with the other sectors and building close relationships with producers and members helps her to be a strong advocate.

What is the Be What the World Needs Campaign and why does it matter?

You may be experiencing an increased volume of communications from the university about its latest fundraising initiative, the Be What the World Needs campaign. This spring USask publicly launched the largest fundraising initiative in its history with the ambitious objective of raising \$500 million.

This is a comprehensive campaign, meaning there are numerous priorities being promoted across the University. However, the overall goal is to attract support to the following priority areas: Support Indigenous achievement, Design Visionary Spaces,

Inspire Students to Succeed and Lead Critical Research. At its core, this fundraising campaign is about raising money, but there are other reasons for undertaking it. With a primary focus on higher education, the university can seem a bit insulated from the realities of those outside its walls.

Having worked on the outside in the private sector and not-forprofit worlds, I can say this criticism isn't completely unfounded. However, to really embrace this campaign and become the University that the world needs has required realistic consideration of our strengths and priorities. It also necessitates increased engagement with our community. AgBio is one of the university's two founding colleges, and agriculture represents one of its priority areas of research. In light of that and, the college's place in addressing global challenges from food security to climate change, I see the campaign as an opportunity to shine a spotlight on our role as a critical problem solver.

The success of the campaign is not just about reaching a fundraising goal, and arguably that's a secondary objective. I think it's far too early to declare the outcomes of this initiative but if the campaign translates into well-deserved recognition of the college's strengths and accomplishments from a broader community then this could set the stage for greater support for AgBio over the long run. This would be a worthwhile achievement in my opinion.

When we entered Voc Ag in 1972 most of our 75 young men were straight from the country into the unsuspecting arms of **Dean Art Stillborn '41 C & Assistant Dean Fred Fulton '50 C**. A Gov't incentive program for "mature" students returning to school called "manpower" kept 20% of the enrolment well supplied with school necessities and improved attendance.

Other U of S Colleges looked at us as a winter retreat for Rural boys, but we took our responsibilities seriously. It became apparent that the AGRO's weren't "challenging" the Engineers enough, so we fertilized their grass with fresh manure (when Animal Science was cleaning corrals) and buried the Engineer's "Tank" with snow using a "borrowed" pay loader from Vet Med parking lot, then applied enough water to hold it firmly in place till June. There was an advanced sheep reproduction study by placing live ewes in the St. A's rez... Most of our "study" sessions seemed to be at the KG or Sutherland Hotels. Professor **Gary Storey '63 C**, no longer took train rides after escorting our class on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange tour!

Dr. Don Rennie '49 C was durn near laughed out of Crop Science class for introducing the crazy idea of reducing summer fallow by "continuous cropping". Just after we had learned how to set a Martin Hitch on discers! (Young farmers today don't even know what that is!) With the birth of Sterling's first daughter, we "smoked" Dr. Red Williams out of Animal Science class with cigars as he was trying to introduce R.O.P. Now, the only thing needed is a steer with 3 ears for all the EID tags.

Virtually ALL of us returned to the Farm or Ranch VERY successfully, there were only 3 or 4 that crossed over to the "Dark Side" working for the Government! Perhaps they were the smarter, as they are now well paid in retirement. Many of our class enjoy southern "crop inspection" duties from Texas to Arizona

to Hawaii on an annual basis to beat the cold, while the rest of us feed cows and curl for winter pastime.

As we all hit 60 years of Ag experience, grandchildren are a very proud topic; all you have to do is ask. In the last couple of years, with no kids returning to take over, about 10% have SOLD the farm. A few more have rented out the land and taken to driving Semi's, now there is a "road trip" for coffee. Daryl started up a large Crane Truck Company in Winnipeg; said it's like farming, work long hrs and always got something to fix. Tom's acres are measured in sq ft of glass as he operated a large greenhouse operation.

Alas, the circle of life has taken 13 of our Grads all too soon, a few more are dealing with serious health problems, it's a reminder that everyday is a good day. As we celebrate our 50th Class Reunion, we have made a point of inviting those Widows to join us "gratis" as they are as much a part of our Grads as our Classmates...

I mention our class of guys, there were NO female students in our class. We had to invite the College of Education, Nurses & Home Ec girls to all functions, always with an eye to our local community futures ... Our Grads are a diverse lot, from every corner of the Prairies; we grew together as Lifelong friends, graduated on the Dean's roll and went on to very successful innovative Agriculture operations, Leadership in our local communities & service organizations, we've run for parliament! This year already there have been three 50th Wedding Anniversaries with more soon! Many of our kids have graduated from U of S College of Ag. I remember at our 20th Reunion, looking over at them "old" AGRO's across the Banquet room and thinking "Holy Crap, what an old look'n bunch of bug'rs!! Sure glad we don't look like them ...

Report on Ukrainian Agriculture

Russia's war against Ukraine continues with no end in sight. Ukraine concentrates on destroying Russia's means to wage war, while Russia concentrates on destroying infrastructure, cultural institutions, and the Ukrainian people.

The safe passage for Ukrainian grain exports negotiated by Turkey in July 2022, expired in July 2023 and Russia immediately began targeting grain storage and export infrastructure in the seaports such as Odesa, Chornomorsk, and Pivdennyi and the Danube River ports such as Izmail and Reni and have destroyed over 300,000 metric tons (mt) of grain and 115 port infrastructures.

Ukraine established a narrow safe corridor hugging the coastal waters of Romania, Bulgaria, and Turkey. However, a Russian missile hit a civilian vessel on November 8. Ukraine has threatened to target ships headed for Russian ports in retaliation and sunk an oil tanker destined for Syria.

Because of favorable weather conditions, Ukraine is expected to harvest 79.1 million mt of grain and oilseed in 2023, surpassing last season's harvest of 76.8 million mt. Ukraine reports 4.7 million hectares (ha) of wheat were harvested this year, with average yield 4.73 mt/ha totaling 22.2 million mt, barley at 5.7 million mt, and corn at 28.5 million mt. Oilseed production could reach 21.6 million mt, while the sunflower harvest may hit 13 million mt and soybean production could reach 4.6 million mt. Canola production is forecast at 4.2 million mt compared to 3.5 million mt in 2022 and will all be exported to Europe via Danube ports and overland routes.

Agricultural workers are only able to utilize 10.895 million ha of land for spring and winter grains, which is 980,000 ha less than last year. By mid-October Ukrainian farmers had planted nearly 4.5 million ha of winter crops. So far, farmers have sown 3,018,000 ha of wheat, 260,000 ha of barley, 63,000 ha of rye, and 1,124,000 ha of winter rapeseed.

The volume of winter crops is expected to drop by 20% compared to last year as farmers lack financial resources. The agricultural sector is heavily indebted by more than Ukraine hryvnia (UAH) 100 billion (\$2.7 billion US), and there are big risks. Low prices, reduced exports and high production costs made growing every major crop except soybeans unprofitable this year.

Costs of shipping by truck or rail are very expensive compared to shipping from seaports. Shipping by barge up the Danube is also expensive because of a lack of barges. Farmers will lose \$55 per mt on their corn and \$44 per mt on their wheat in 2023-24 under the pessimistic scenario. It will be the first time in 20 years that farming has been unprofitable in the war-torn country.

World wheat prices have held mainly because of bumper crops in other wheat producing nations and the fact that Russian agriculture is not under sanctions so they can export their wheat via the Black Sea.

Letter From a Prairie Chicken

In 1984, Derald & I were enlisted by our Ag. Rep, **Daryl Tumbach**, '72 C, to become Crop Reporters for the R.M. of Big Stick. As our farm is in the SE corner of the R.M., our reports did not necessarily reflect the average of the R.M. For the first few years, we recorded rainfall, crop progress, soil moisture depth, damage from hail, gophers & grasshoppers, and commented on any unusual weather events. We filled out a form and raced it to town to mail to Regina. We were fortunate that the Ahners had been rainfall reporters in the '50's and had been supplied with a rain gauge graduated in 100ths of an inch. We still use it and then translate the amount to millimetres for the current generation.

The system moved on to phoning in the weekly report. I developed a very friendly relationship with several of the staff answering the phone on Monday mornings. This lasted till after we completed our 30th year in the fall of 2014 as we did not have access to the Internet till late in our reporting career. I do check the weekly Crop Report from time to time and unfortunately there are currently no reporters in our corner of Saskatchewan. This does not help when the Dept. of Agriculture makes decisions regarding drought, pests or excess water problems. This service is still a vital part of our industry. It doesn't take a great deal of time each week, so I hope that the younger generations of our Ag. Grads who are presently farming will step up and carry on with Crop Reporting.

U of S Agriculture Student Clubs Updates

The USask Pre-Vet club is a community of prospective veterinarians, helping students figure out if a career in vet med is right for them and provide them with support with their vet school applications. The club hosts events such as mock interviews, animalbased labs, charity fundraisers (currently collecting donations for the SPCA and "We all Need a Rescue") and community nights.

This year the AgBizz club in addition to their regular club activities, are working towards revitalizing the CAMA (Canadian Agri-food Marketers Alliance) Student Chapter, which had ceased operations during the pandemic. In CAMA, students create a marketing plan for an agricultural product to present at the national competition in Kansas City, Missouri, in April. The group also has tours planned with local breweries and distilleries, an internal student development seminar with MNP and a home case study competition to sharpen skills.

This year the Food and Bioproduct Sciences (FABS) Club hosted a distillery tour, trivia night and meet the professors event, and pumpkin carving. They had a 'shave-away event' where Dr. Michael Nickerson, Department Head volunteered to shave his head for donations reaching \$1,500 for Haven Family Connections. For the holiday season, the club is doing a Holiday Hamper Drive for Ronald McDonald House Charities in Saskatoon.
